MALONEY WHIPS JACK DELANEY

Crushing Attack Batters Down Bridgeport, Conn., Rapier

NEW YORK, Feb. 19 (AP)—A re-remembrance of the famous John J. Sullivan loomed today as a prospective heavy-weight king.

A new Boston "strong boy", burlap Edward James Maloney, humiliated Jack Delaney, light-heavy-weight king, to defeat in his third-crammed round last night before the largest throng that ever jammed Madison Square Garden.

And with Maloney's decisive victory by decision—a victory clean cut in every respect, came realization to the 18,344 spectators that a good big man can whip a good little man every time. Weight—a decisive margin of 21 pounds—and a merry-go-round, that never knew a backward step brought defeat to the spectacular Delaney.

From the opening gong, the Boston giant threw his bulk into his 172-pound rival. Two massive arms drove grunting smashes through the best guard the Bridgeport, Conn., rapier could offer while a flinty jaw and bulging muscles body absorbed the mightiest shots of Delaney's crashing broadsides. The result was inevitable. Most ring-side critics awarded Maloney six rounds by decisive margins. Delaney two by a shade, with two even.

There were no knockdowns. Although Delaney's vaunted right hand smashes and uppercut landed clean and true on Maloney's jaw, time and again, the Boston bludgeon was too big, too strong, and too steeped in reserve power force to more than shake his shabby head like an irritated grizzly and crash forward for more.

The result, a startling upset in view of the 12 to five odds on Delaney at gong time, sent a host of Boston supporters' their pockets crammed with money back on the midnight train to the city Maloney's followers would like to give him. Boston had backed Maloney for 10 to the first and many were the remarks about "his" New York money.

Out of the Delaney defeat, however, came word that the sparkling French Canadian in the third round had aggravated an old thumb injury, suffered in last match with Paul Benoit.

Although the thumb was badly swollen, it was not definitely established that the bone was broken. Otherwise the total visible injury consisted of a black eye for Maloney and cut lips for Delaney.

Gross receipts for the match totaled \$20,725, a record for indoor fights. The best previous mark, \$162,000 was set by the Bertone-Delaney bout in 1925.

The fight was part of Tex Rickard's elimination tournament to decide Gene Tunney's challenger next September. Maloney probably will be matched with the winner of the Sharkey-McTigue fight at Madison Square Garden March 5.
