CHINESE STRIKE ADDS TO STRIFE

American and British Naval Officers Beaten in Ichang by Mob

Nationalist sympathizers in Shanghai are on strike as support to Cantonese army now coming closer to the great commercial metropolis, radical leaders seek a general strike.

Marshall Sun Chuan-fang, defender of Shanghai, prepared to make a last stand at Sunkiang, only 25 miles south of the city.

Foreign forces in Shanghai, aggregating more than 10,000 men, are ready to defend concessions, while a "precautionary mobilization" of the volunteer defense corps of residents of international settlement is ordered in preparation against possible strike disorders.

Several cars in the international settlement were stoned and service was stopped. One American and one British naval officer were beaten in a demonstration at Ichang.

Tokyo orders a Japanese cruiser and four destroyers to proceed immediately to Shanghai.

With the Colorado near Yuma, Embankments are being thrown across the sloughs leading to the old bee channel in an effort to prevent the flood waters from reaching the Volcano Lake levee, the main line of defense for the valley farms.

Conditions in other sections approached normal today following the storm which during the first four days of the week deluged the southland. Although no additional property damage was reported, the death toll had mounted to 25 last night with the discovery of three more bodies in the wake of the storm.

The latest fatality was revealed when the body of R. H. Fore, Los Angeles aviator, was found floating in the surf near San Diego. His plane was wrecked when he ran into a dense fog while carrying a cargo of yeast to San Diego bakers, who were threatened with a famine.

With San Diego still cut off from rail and highway communication yesterday naval craft was pressed into service to carry mail to the southern city when eagle boat number 34, loaded with sacks of dehydrated mail, put out from San Pedro.

Signs Income Tax Bill
Governor Patterson has signed the state income tax bill. The governor lost no time in attaching his signature to the measure after it reached his desk yesterday afternoon soon after the house had concurred in the senate amendments to the measure.

The thing bill, house bill 498, was today made a special order by the senate for Monday at 2 o'clock.

Looking toward the erection of a new capitol building, Senator Joseph today introduced a joint resolution authorizing the state board of control to select and adopt plans and specifications and estimate the cost of construction in units so the cost might be distributed over a period of years.

The board if the resolution is adopted, will report to the 1927 session of the legislature.

KILL COURT BILL

The second effort to get a district court bill enacted was frustrated today when the senate killed by indefinite postponement house bill 602. The measure provided for district courts in counties of more than 35,000 and less than 100,000 population. The adverse report, said it was not satisfactory to the Marion county senators.

Dog Count for 1927 Expected to Better Last Year's 503 Record

Dog licenses are now on sale at the city office, have been for several days. Already, although it did not become generally known until today, two score or more tags have been purchased.

La Grande's legal dog population last year—at least the actual number of canines that bore a city license—totaled 503, a new high record for this city.

City officials and observers expect the number to become even greater this year.

As has been the case for several years, Police Chief Clint Haynes' fox terrier, Payche, gets tag No. 1. Emma Fowler's Boston bull won No. 2.

Leo Barker's ardale will bear license No. 15 during the year and whether it is amiable or not remains to be seen.

Of the first ten licenses granted, four were for fox terriers, two were for collies, two for pointers, one for a Weimaraner, and the other for a Boston bull.

Birnie's Great Dane, Movie Dog Relative, Dies

Wapt, Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Birnie's Great Dane dog, known to most of the people of La Grande, died Thursday night apparently from heart failure, as there was no indication of suffering.

Mrs. Birnie missed the dog about noon yesterday and found him in his dog house, lying as if asleep with his enormous head between his two front feet.

Wapt was seven years old and was known for his enormous size, weighing about 125 pounds. Mr. and Mrs. Birnie had owned him since he was a pup three months old—but even then he was as large as the ordinary size dog. In spite of his size he was absolutely harmless. He followed Mrs. Birnie on most of her hikes and horseback rides, although he could not follow the horses in the valley, his size causing him to tire easily and become foot sore.

The big dog was the only one of his kind in La Grande and his absence has already been felt. But Wapt had a history without establishing one for himself—he was the grandson of the Great Dane who appeared in many Mack Senott pictures here several years ago, and known to many local dog enthusiasts and theater goers. The Hollywood dog was burned in a studio fire a few years ago.

CONGRESS MAKES READY FOR MAR. 4

With Three Bills Off Its Hands, Legislation Tangle Clearing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—With three major measures sent to President Coolidge during this week, congress hopes to further clear its legislative decks before its fifth session fades into history March fourth.

Counting the enacted McNary-Haugen farm relief, McFadden branch banking and radio control bills as important legislative achievements the senate and house now are faced with the untangling of the long-controverted Boulder canyon legislation as a major task in less than two weeks remaining in the session.

Another problem is likely to flare up in the three-culmer construction program called for in the navy appropriation bill, in view of the developments in the president's naval limitation proposal.

Men and Planes Quit San Diego For Nicaragua

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 19 (AP)—Eight officers and 80 men, together with six De Havilland airplanes, made up an airplane expeditionary force that left here at 10 o'clock this morning on the destroyer tender Altair bound for service in Nicaragua. At midnight last night the destroyer tender Melville sailed from here for Nicaragua with 100 marines aboard. Both the Melville and Altair had originally been ordered to proceed to the Atlantic with the vessels of the Pacific battle fleet. Orders for the Melville to take the marines to Nicaragua were received prior to the sailing of the fleet last Thursday, but the Altair was 25 miles south of here with the fleet when ordered to return to port and take aboard the airplane force.

Dentist's Bail Is Set at \$35,000.00

SEATTLE, Feb. 19 (AP)—Dr. C. C. Dobbs, Kirkland dentist, accused of the murder of Letitia Whitehall, school girl patient, today won his fight for admission to bail, when Superior Judge Malcolm Douglas fixed the bond at \$35,000. The equivalent of \$34,000 has already been raised, George H. Granger, defense attorney said and predicted that Dr. Dobbs will spend the week end with his family after being in jail four days.
