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kettle or casserole and add meat. Cover with remaining bacon, onion and lemon cut in thin slices and turnip and carrot. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and add 2 cups boiling water. Cover closely and cook over a low fire or in a moderate oven for three hours. When tender, remove to platter and strain liquor in pan. Add water to make 2 cups and thicken with 1 1/2 tablespoons flour stirred to a smooth paste with a little cold water. Let the gravy boil for five minutes after thickening to insure thorough cooking of the flour.

Stale cake is freshened by dipping it in cold milk then reheating in a medium oven.
An interesting waffle variation is made by substituting 1 cup of hot boiled rice for 1 cup of flour in the standard recipe.
Repainting kitchen walls at frequent intervals with fresh paint keeps away all insects and pests, and fills cracks and crevices.
An attractive color combination for the kitchen is a delicate shade of lilac for the walls and nite green for the woodwork. The curtains may be lilac and white or lilac and black checked gingham. The furniture may be painted nite green with stenciled designs in black.
