EMPLOYMENT IN INLAND EMPIRE IS IMPROVING

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 23—Employment conditions in the Inland Empire and other Eastern Oregon and Washington and Idaho districts are gradually improving, according to the 4L employment office in this city. There is yet a surplus of nearly all kinds of labor, the 4L said, but the situation has been considerably improved during the past month.

Several more pine sawmills will resume cutting about March 1, the 4L reported. Logging camps are active and are operating with a very light labor turnover. General construction work is requiring but few men for replacements.
