APPLE EXPORTS SHOW INCREASE

Foreign Countries Becom-
ing More Familiar with
Northwest Fruit

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 22 (AP).—Exports of boxed apples from the United States are showing a steady increase from year to year as foreign countries become more familiar with the choice fruit from the Pacific northwest and in bet-
ter shape financially to do busi-
ness.

During the past year the export of boxed apples showed an in-
crease of approximately 2,000,000
boxes over 1925 and in excess of
any year since 1922, according to
department of agriculture figures.

A post holiday lull is shown in
the local produce trade. Receipts
of dairy products continue liberal
but prices displayed a generally
steady tone.

Butter and eggs are steady and
unchanged. Prints are moving out
at the 52-cent level with top grade
colors still listed at 47 cents. But-
terfat bids are now well in line
with 52 cents being paid in the
country and 54 cents Portland.

Fresh extra eggs are holding at
the 25-cent level with current
receipts at 24 cents.

Wheat's Power to Rally Not Strong

CHICAGO, Feb. 22 (By the As-
sociated Press).—Starting 1/2 to
3/4 off, wheat showed but little
power to rally. Corn, oats and
provisions went sharply down-
grade, corn opening 1/4 to 1/2
lower and continued to decline.

Corn closed heavy, 1/2 to 3/4 cent
lower, wheat 1/2 to 3/4 cent down,
oats 1/2 to 1 1/2 off and provisions
1 to 1 1/2 up.

Prices Advance Again in Wall Street Market

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (By the
Associated Press).—Easier call
money rates and expanding steel
mill operations provided back-
ground for another advance in
prices in today's stock market.
Pools were active in both rails
and specialties but they appeared
to encounter stronger resistance.

Elevation of U. S. Steel common
to the highest price ever recorded
coincided with announcement that
mill operations had increased to
above 50 per cent of capacity. In-
dependent steels also improved.

With the judicial determination
of the methods employed by the
I. C. C. in its railroad valuation
plan indefinitely delayed by Mon-
day's decision in the Los Angeles-
Salt Lake case, rails continued to
advance strongly. Frisco common
was the only issue to reach new
high ground in the early trading.

The closing was strong.
Motor, food and public utility
issues were in the van of the late
drive which ran three to five
points in many instances. Total
sales approximated \$400,000
shares.

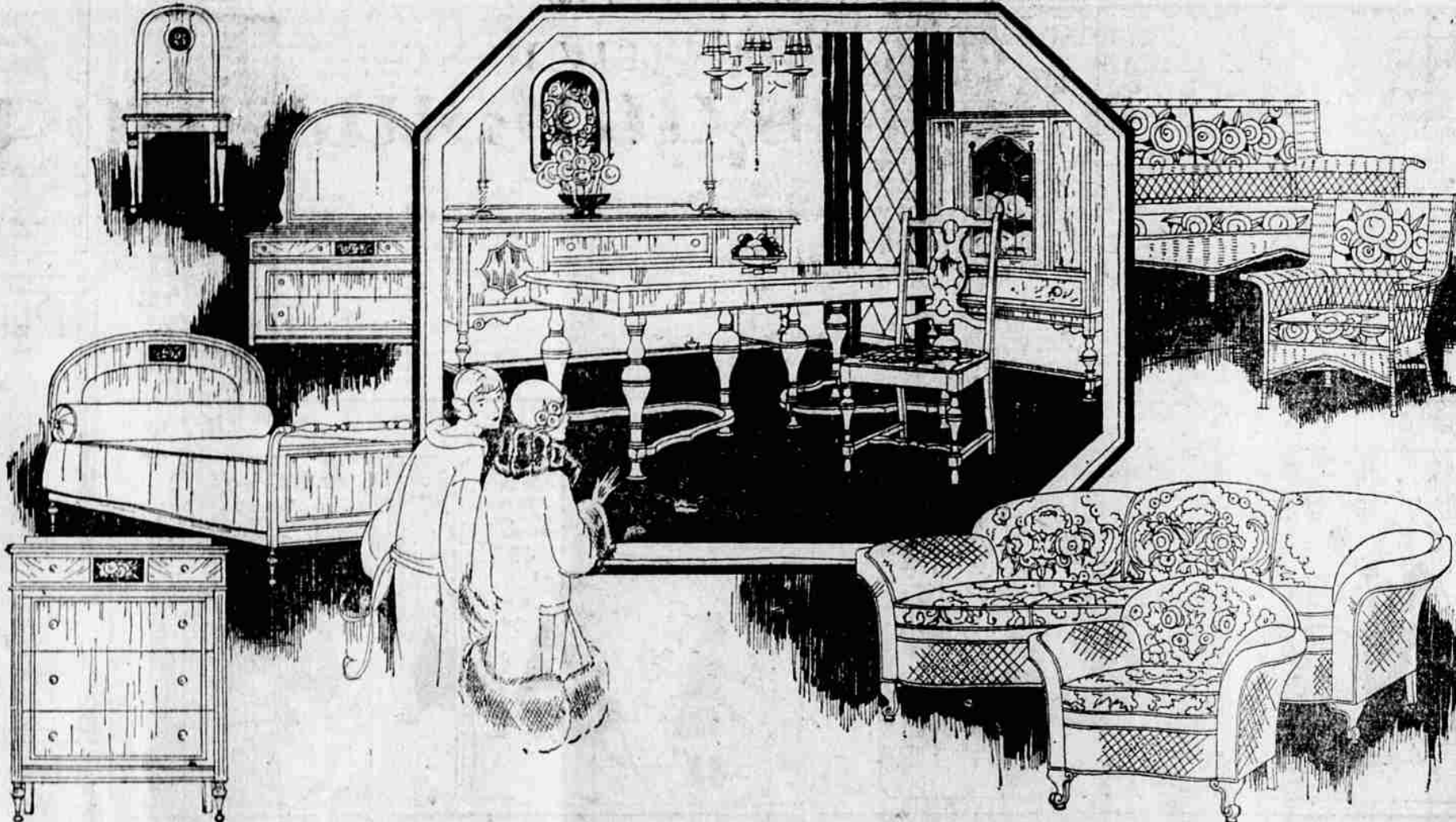
