PAULINO FIGHTS HANSEN TONIGHT

"Tiger" of Spain to Take
on Midwestern Dane
Dane in New York

NEW YORK, Feb. 25 (AP)—The only "tiger" in pugilistic captivity ventures forth from his bar tonight to stalk his first heavy-weight victim in the rosin dust of Tex Rickard's spacious Madison Square Garden.

Hitting in color and interest the memorable appearance of Luis Firpo here as a contender will be the entry into the arena of Paulino—demolishing importation from Spain. Against him in a ten-round struggle will be pitted the young and powerful midwestern Dane, Knute Hansen.

So many foreign heavyweights have come here with brittle reputations that random has been skeptical of the prowess of Paulino.

Critics who have visited his training camp workouts declare

him to be awkward and lumbering. But they also report that the "tiger" packs a tremendous wallop in both fists and that his built like rushes will revive memories of the hurricane assault of Firpo on Jack Dempsey.

Hansen made his reappearance in Tex Rickard's heavyweight tournament two months ago with a point victory over Monte Mann after having been temporarily sidetracked by a defeat at the hands of the German entry Franz Dier.

TRAINING CAMP NEWS IN DEMAND

Fans Expected to "Eat
Up" Early Reports More
Than Ever This Year

Never in the history of baseball will training camp news be more welcome than this year.

The baseball fans have been fed up on scandal as well as the politics of the game. They are eager for a change of diet.

Baseball facts are what fandom craves after a long winter of discontent, filled with many unpleasant things that didn't help the game.

However, baseball enthusiasts are eminently fair. A majority of them remain loyal to the game because they feel it is bigger than the individual, no matter how great a star he may be.

Exaggerated Figures
After the scandal had been straightened out, I was hopeful that some real facts would take the place of alleged crookedness.

The signing of Ty Cobb and Speaker, the moment they were cleared of the charges of having thrown a ball game, became paramount to the scandal issue.

Having been handed a lot of bunk during the winter, I am inclined to think that few of the fans took the statements relative to Cobb and Speaker seriously.

Speaker is reported to have received \$50,000 for signing a contract with Washington. Cobb was first said to have received \$75,000 for putting his signature to a Philadelphia contract. The figure was later changed to \$60,000.

Hope They Get It
Getting \$50,000 and \$60,000 for playing 154 games of ball is a lot of money.

Personally, I hope both Speaker and Cobb are getting all that and more. They have done much for baseball, have helped put the game over.

Yet the figures do not ring true, when you consider that Cobb received \$40,000 a year plus a bonus of \$10,000 for managing and playing at Detroit. That was during the days when Cobb was baseball's greatest attraction.

Speaker has admitted that his salary as player and manager for the Cleveland club brought him a similar amount.

I hope it's true, but it hardly seems conceivable that these two stars as mere players, past the peak of their game, should receive as much and more than ever before in their careers.

I am inclined to think that a majority of fandom have read those figures and simply regarded it as more hokum.

No Official Word
True, neither the management of the Washington or Philadelphia club has made any official statement as to the salaries paid the two big stars. It isn't customary.

Possibly the \$50,000 and \$60,000 figure originated in the fertile brain of some scribe who scented a good story as a result of the padded numerals.

It is in a sense, baseball publicity, but unless it is true, is a form of press agentry that really doesn't help after all the "dirt" of the winter.

Publicity not based on fact never helped any enterprise. The finger of suspicion that he pointed at baseball since the close of the season is going to make the public doubt the authenticity of the Cobb-Speaker figures given out.

Let's have more facts and less fancy.

ONLY THREE FOUNDERS IN MINORS' ALLIANCE

Only three of the men who gathered in Chicago, Sept. 5, 1901, to form the National Association of Baseball Leagues, are still on the membership roster. The association comprises what are known as the minor leagues.

Of the surviving trio, Mike Sexton is the second president the association has had in its 26 years. John H. Farrell has been secretary from the start, and Thomas Hickey has become president of the American association. Sexton was president of the ILL league when the association was born. Farrell headed the New York State League and Hickey was directing the Western.
