Music Recital To Be Held on Monday Evening

An interesting program has been planned for Monday evening, Feb. 28, when the Eastern Oregon school of music will present its pupils in recital at the Neighborhood club rooms.

Seventeen pupils will appear in addition to a junior orchestra which is under the direction of Leo Cullen Bryant, and includes not only students of the school, but other young musicians of the city.

It is Mr. Bryant's idea to form a permanent music organization of this kind in La Grande, for the benefit of the young musicians. There are about 20 pupils in the orchestra at present and he hopes to have twice that many before long.

Covers were laid for 22 around a dinner table prettily decorated with bouquets of carnations. After dinner the remainder of the evening was enjoyed visiting.

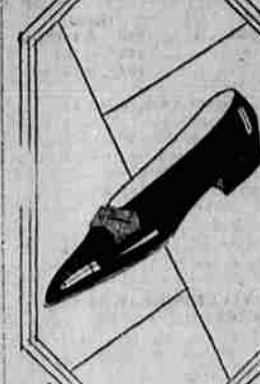

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST — California grapes, cereal, thin cream, creamed dried beef on toast, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Sausage rolls, candied sweet potatoes, creamed spinach, stuffed apple salad, cheese cups, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baker bluefish with lemon butter, lattice potatoes, buttered brussels sprouts, French endive with French dressing, frozen pears, coconut macaroons, rye rolls, milk, coffee.

Frozen fruits are simple, delicious desserts that will particularly appeal to the woman who uses an electric refrigerator. The fruit is usually frozen without stirring. The pears are garnished with whipped cream, sweetened and flavored with vanilla. The cream is thoroughly chilled but not frozen.

With the fish season upon us, a recipe for lemon butter seems especially apropos. Broiled or baked fish are vastly improved if served with this accompaniment.

Lemon Butter I

One-fourth cup butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons hot water, ½ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper.

Work flour into butter, add lemon juice and hot water and cook, stirring constantly until mixture is thick and smooth. Do not let boil. Stir in salt and pepper and serve.

Lemon Butter II

One-fourth cup butter, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, ½ teaspoon sugar.

Cream butter and slowly beat in lemon juice and sugar. Chill and serve.
