## Clubwomen Hear Poetry Program At Tuesday Meet

One of the most interesting programs of the Neighborhood club women was given yesterday afternoon when the regular meeting of the club was held in the library building.

New Voices in American Poetry was the subject for the afternoon's program and it was very ably handled by Miss Mabel Doty, chairman in charge, and her assistants.

After a brief review of poetry, telling what it is as expressed by various writers, Miss Doty told something of the new poetry and its difference from the poetry of several years ago. She then called upon Miss Gladys Miller, who played a piano solo, "Rondo" from "The Toy Box" by Debussy.

Following Miss Miller's number, Miss Doty introduced a group of modern poets, all but one of which are living and writing today. Amy Lowell was the first poet introduced. Mrs. George S. Birnie read her poem "Patriotism" while it was given in pantomime by Miss Henrietta Herring, the stage of the club room being arranged to represent a garden, of which the poem speaks.

T. A. Daly, a dialect writer, was the next poet introduced, and Miss Ruth Johnson gave two of his poems, "My Carolina" and "The Little Boy."

Edgar Lee Masters and Vachel Lindsay represented the middle western group of poets and as a sample of Masters' work Mrs. Birnie read several selections from "Spoon River Anthology." Miss Johnson gave Lindsay's "Abraham Lincoln Walks at Midnight" as a sample of his work.

Sara Teasdale was introduced as one of the principal lyric poets. One of her love lyrics entitled "The Look" was sung by Miss Myrtle Willenck, accompanied by Miss Gladys Miller at the piano, and two others were given by Miss Ruth Johnson.

The Miller violin ensemble, composed of Mrs. Leo Miller, Mrs. Andrew Paylor, Mrs. Roy Farnum and Mrs. Emmett Smith, played two numbers, "The Blacksmith" and "Concert Waltz" by Severin. The last part of the program was a little playlet entitled "Fables and Chimeras" given by a group of children from Central school and directed by Miss Doty and Miss Mildred Hoyt. Poems given by the children throughout the play were those of James Whitcomb Riley and Rose Fyleman.

The scene was in a nursery and the children, Margaret Dixon, Ruth Byers, Patricia Longfellow, Caryle Wilson, Rex Lowry and Dick Larkin, were telling what they believed about fairies. As a close little Maxine Harris appeared as a fairy in a solo dance.

A clever feature of the afternoon were the programs given out telling of the various numbers. The programs were made of pieces of paper, which were also used to decorate the club room.

During the business meeting of the club which preceded the program the opera "The Rose Maiden" to be given by the Monday Musical Friday evening, March 4, was announced by Mrs. H. P. Murphy, chairman of the Monday musical.

## MENUS

BREAKFAST — Orange juice, cereal, thin cream, baked hash, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Noodle soup, toast sticks, cottage cheese-salad and green pepper salad, cup custard, milk, tea.

DINNER — Broiled lamb chops, potatoes en casserole, canned lima beans, new onions and radishes, fig and orange jelly, vanilla cookies, milk, coffee, whole wheat rolls.

These are simple menus planned to meet the needs of a family made up of small children as well as adults. While children under school age and persons well past middle age will not want the hash suggested for breakfast, growing

children and active adults need the extra breakfast dish.

Fig and orange jelly will be enjoyed by the whole family.

Fig and Orange Jelly

One and 1/2 cups chopped figs, 1 1/2 cups fig juice, 3/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons granulated gelatin, 1 lemon, 3/4 cups orange juice.

Wash figs through many waters. Cover with cold water and let stand over night. Cook in the same water until tender. Drain, reserving liquor, of which there should be 1 1/2 cups, and chop figs. Heat sugar and fig juice and bring to the boiling point. Stir in gelatin softened in 4 tablespoons cold water. Remove from fire and add juice of lemon and orange juice. Let stand until beginning to set. Stir in chopped figs and turn into a mold first dipped in cold water. Let stand until thoroughly chilled and firm. Serve with whipped cream. ## The Garden

### FOR THE BLUE BORDER

Blue is a favorite color in the garden, and pure blue one of the most tones to supply. The annual border needs its blues to balance the color scale and to add a cool touch during the hot months of summer. We have an excellent new blue in the Chinese forget-me-not, *Cynoglossum amabile*, listed as an annual from sowing early outdoors. It has deep and intense blue flower clusters produced in great profusion, making a brilliant patch in the garden as well as being fine for cutting.

It much resembles the Italian alkanet, *Anchusa italica*, a favorite in the perennial border for its intense blue, but is of lower growth and much less coarse in foliage. This is a real addition to the blue annuals.

An old standby is the bachelor button or centaura and *Emperors* William is still the popular favorite with its fringed blue flowers produced in great profusion with good stems for cutting.

The annual lupines give some fine blues although all have more or less purple in them and are one of the most valuable of the annuals. They must be sown where they are to bloom and then be thinned as they are difficult to transplant.

Another beautiful blue annual not enough used is the brawallia. It has intense blue flowers freely

produced and is easily grown. Although this is an excellent garden annual it is more frequently seen as a pot plant.

The rich blue spikes of the annual lupins with their pen-shaped blooms add to the flat of hand-some blue annuals for the blue portion of the border and for the edges there are the gorgeous depths of the lobelias and the velvet of the blue-toned pansies. The blue section of the border needs the planting of groups of pink, pale yellow and white to give the blues their best effects and to avoid monotony.

The blue-toned ten-week stocks and asters give solidity to the blue border and have their own pink, white and cream by way of harmony. The blue portion of the annual border is most effective if in partial shade. All these annuals may be easily raised from seed planted in an outdoor seedbed when the soil is workable.

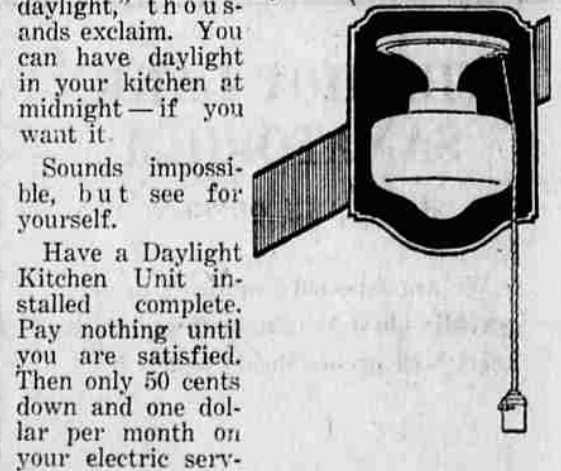
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
