DAIRY PRODUCTS GO STILL LOWER

All Grades of Eggs Drop
a Cent—Butter Slumps
from 1 to 1 1/2 Cents

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 2 (AP)—Dairy products are easing to lower levels in the local market, due largely to heavy production and receipts and partly to a narrow shipping outlet.

On the dairy exchange all grades of eggs were posted a cent lower with extras now down to the 22-cent level. Firsts are listed at 22 cents, mediums 21 cents and current receipts 20 cents. Local dealers, however, are paying premiums on well graded stocks. Receipts of eggs from the country yesterday amounted to 902 cases. Local storage stocks increased 233 cases for the day, bringing Portland color holdings up to 1155 cases.

In the butter division extras ranged from 1 to 1 1/2 cents lower, with standards showing the greatest loss. Extras are down to 46 cents, standards 45, prime firsts 45 and firsts 44 1/2 cents.

Bears Control Stock Exchange Trading Today

NEW YORK, Mar. 2 (AP)—A further downward readjustment of prices took place in today's stock market despite sporadic attempts to rally the general list by bidding up special stocks.

The slashing of the annual dividends on Stromberg Carborundum from \$6 to \$2 drove that stock down to 40 1/2, the lowest price in five years.

Offerings of other automotive issues increased. Rubbers, however, were under steady accumulation. Goodrich was standing out with an early gain of over three points.

Pier Marquette jumped five points and Erie first preferred rallied sharply but some of the other so-called "merger rails" were distinctly heavy.

The closing was weak. Touching off of stop loss created the late decline which reached three to four points in various shares, including International Harvester and General Motors. A few isolated points of strength continued, notably General Railway Signal which crossed 105 to a new record. Total sales approximated 2,200,000 shares.

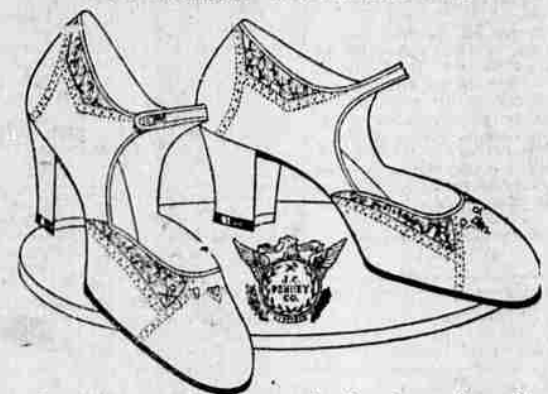

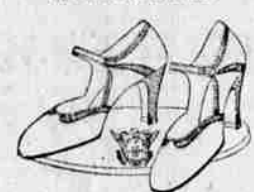

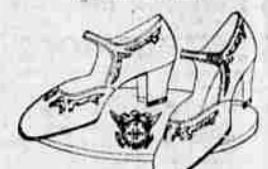
