Weather Warmer, Snow Is Melting In Wallowa Area

WALLOWA, Ore., Mar. 3 (AP).—With mild weather prevailing in this section the snow continues to melt away considerably each day. All roads in the valley section and many of those leading into the blue mountains

practically bare of snow. Some of the dirt roads in the valley, where a considerable amount of hauling is being done, are getting deep in many places. The snow has settled in the fields, but with some melting at night is not disappearing as rapidly as many thought it would. Nearly all crops are being fed yet, as only a few pastures have the snow melted away sufficiently to allow stock to make their way without some feed.

Recent reports state that hay is

becoming scarce and farmers having hay are in no hurry to let it go until they see how long they will have to feed. No material change in prices of hay appear to have come, the most of the hay sold at any recent date has been around \$10 per ton. With the snow getting well off of some of the range land in some parts of the country, some stockmen expect to move part of their horses out before very long.

BUTTER PRICES CONTINUE LOWER

Quotations on Portland Dairy Exchange Show Half a Cent Loss

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 3 (AP).—Cuba butter prices continue on a lower trend here due to declines in outside consuming markets. Quotations on the dairy exchange for the day show a loss of a half cent on all grades but prime firsts, which declined a cent.

Extra cubes are down to 45¢, cents, standards 44¢, cents with the lower grades posted at 44¢ cents. Weakness still prevails in the local egg market with country receipts coming in a liberal fashion. Prices held on the dairy exchange but current receipts eased off another cent to 19 cents. Receipts yesterday amounted to 2,036 cases. The street is almost bare of poultry and prices are on a firm basis. Some of the dealers are bringing in stock from the north in order to meet their local requirements. Heavy hens, live, are firm at 24 cents, with light hens up to 21 cents. Dressed turkeys are slow at 35 to 39 cents.

Wheat Closes at a Lower Figure

CHICAGO, Mar. 3 (AP).—Opening unchanged to 3¢ lower. Chicago wheat underwent a moderate general setback. Corn and oats were also easier, corn starting unchanged to half cent off and subsequently receding all around. Provisions were firm. Wheat closed easy, 3/4 to 5¢ down; corn 3/4 to 5¢ down; oats 1/4 to 1/2¢ off and provisions unchanged to a setback of 7 cents.
