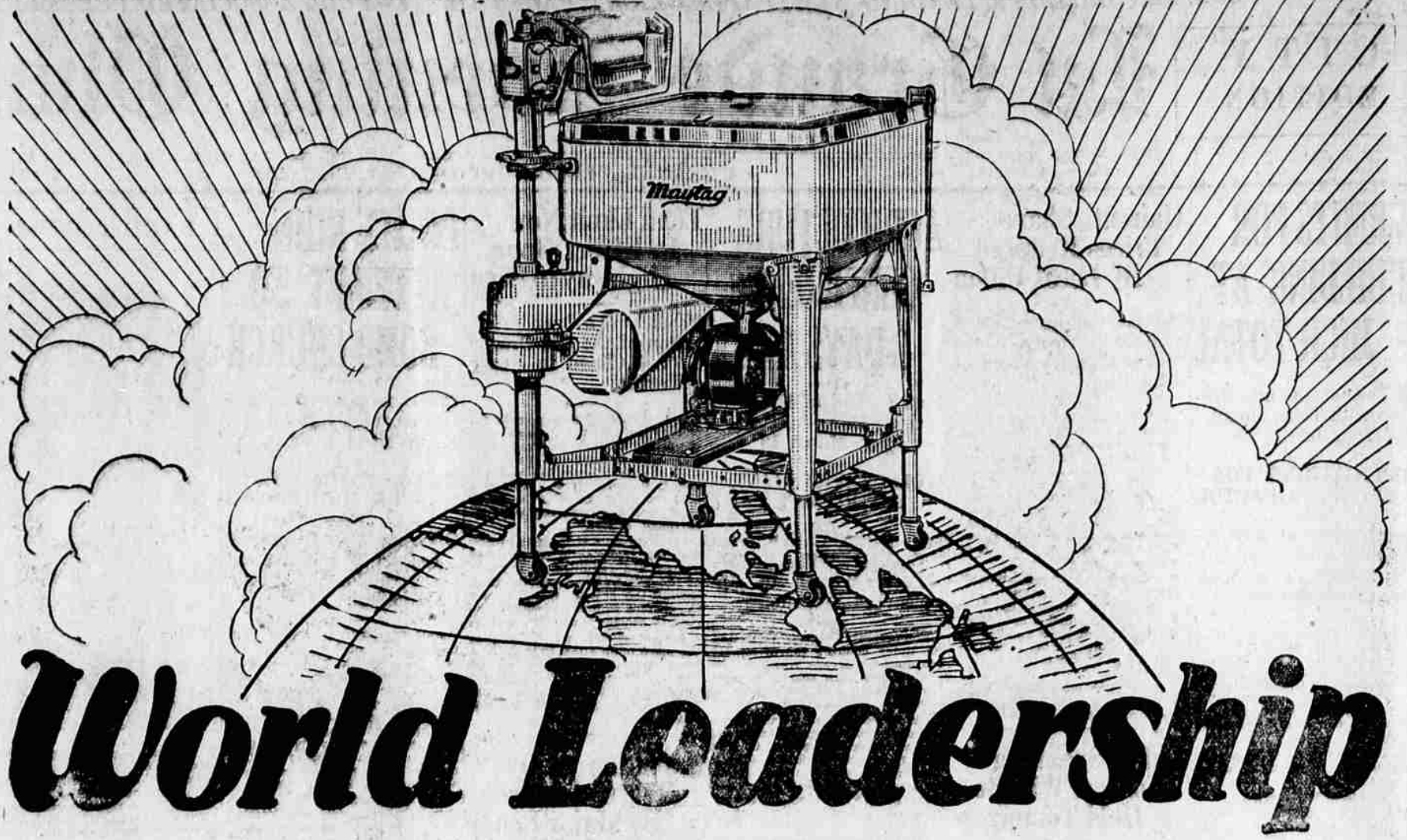
### NEW RUSSIAN RANGE

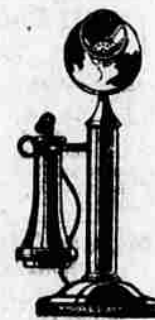
