PRINCES RIBBOURGH, Eng., Mar. 7.—Mrs. Graham, housekeeper at Chequers, who has become known as the "minister of the interior" because of her job of helping to keep the prime minister fit by the proper food has decided to retire after many years service in one branch or another of the government. Mrs. Graham was housekeeper at Chequers during the war, when Lloyd George was prime minister, and it was to this country place he retired to recuperate when worn out with the responsibilities of state.

Hansway MacDonald came after Mr. Lloyd George, and Mrs. Graham continued her services, as she did when Stanley Baldwin took over, thus she has been the head of the house under a Liberal, a Labor and a Conservative prime minister.

She has declined to write reminiscences of the great men she has served as guests and residents of the prime minister's country place.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Canned cherries, cereal, thin cream, crisp broiled bacon, soft cooked eggs, crisp white wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Tomato soup, mock oyster salad, health bread and butter, sandwiches, Sadio's pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Casserole of smoked salmon, twice baked potatoes, en-dive salad, rye bread, canned Bartlett pears, fudge cake, milk, coffee.

The hostess suggested in the luncheon menu served a two-fold purpose: it whets the appetite and furnishes the only hot dish. The luncheon pudding is nourishing and easily digested. Small children as well as elderly persons will enjoy this dessert.

Sadio's Pudding

Three and one-half cups hot milk, 2 tablespoons granulated gelatine, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup boiled chestnuts, 1 slice candied pineapple, 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Soften gelatine in 1/2 cup milk and scald remaining milk in top of double boiler. When milk reaches boiling point, stir in softened gelatine and add yolks of eggs well beaten with sugar and salt. Cook over hot water until mixture begins to thicken. Add chestnuts which have been boiled, peeled and chopped, and pineapple finely chopped. Cook a minute longer, stirring vigorously. Remove from fire and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a mold and chill. Serve with whipped cream.

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Voting in Congress Compared to Athletic Game—Each Vote a Run

WASHINGTON—Watching congress vote on measures of import can be made fully as exciting as a football game if one can become as interested in the outcome.

Votes are scored far more frequently and much faster than touchdowns, and on a close vote, the element of suspense is added to the rapidity of play.

First one side edges ahead and then the other, for the yeas and nays scoreboards is arranged alphabetically. The senate plays the game in shortest time, of course, for it has but 96 members as against 435 in the house.

And it's vastly more thrilling if you don't know on which side a player is going to play until he goes into action.

Like a Game

This season's classics were the votes on the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill. The scoreboard of that famous contest in the senate will give you an idea of what we mean.

Achurst established a one-run lead for the yeas, but Bayard, Bingham, Bleasie and Borah completely smothered the attack. With Bruce's vote in, the score stood 5 to 2. After Cameron and Capper had pulled up on the nays, Caraway tied the score and Copeland broke the tie only to have it re-established, 6 to 5, by Couzens.

Deussen broke the next tie of 7 to 7 and Dill gave the yeas a lead of two titles, only to have Edwards and Ernest bring the score to 9 all. On the first play in the "11" inning, after Hale had voted, the count stood, may 17, yeas 14, Harrison made it 19 to 15, but this lead dwindled and the nays never again equaled it.
