Safety Pin Deadly to Children; Doctor, However, Can Retrieve It

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 9. (AP)—Safety pins have killed more children than have firearms in the opinion of Dr. Chevalier Jackson of the Pennsylvania university medical faculty, who has designed instruments for retrieving small objects from lungs and stomachs.

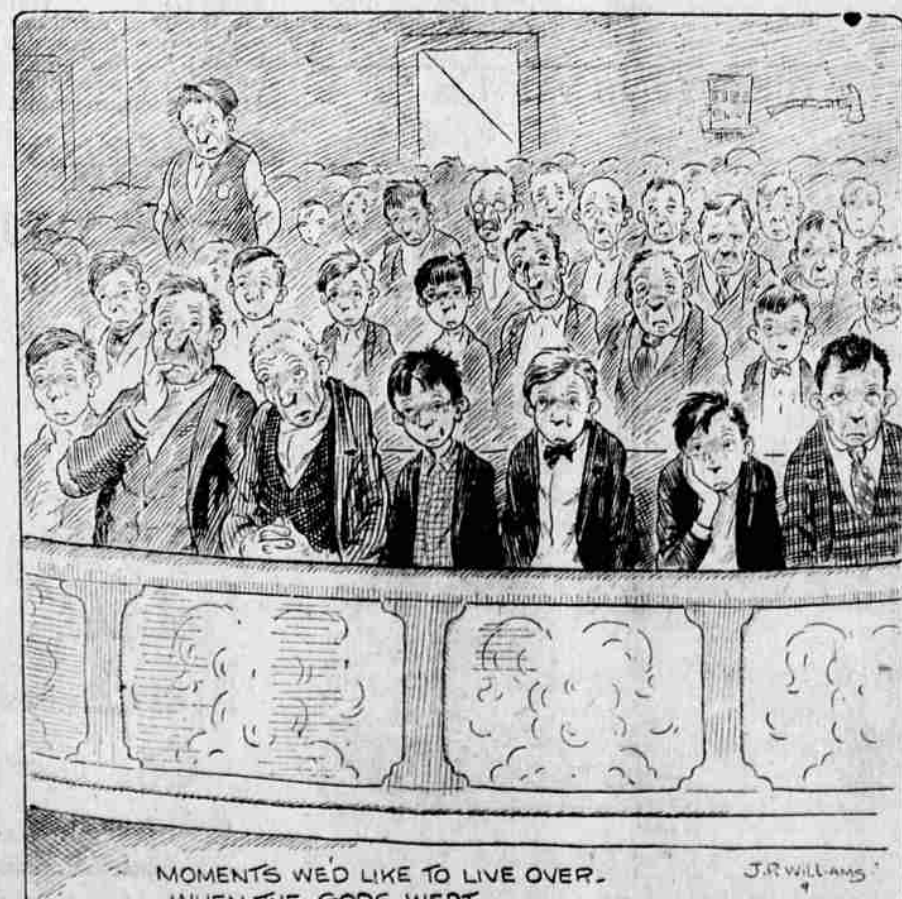
Careless mothers who put pins in their mouths when dressing their babies, he says, set an example which is likely to be followed with possibly disastrous results.

"It took me 25 years to master the swallowed safety pin," he declares. He mastered its recovery with a safety pin closer, operated through a bronchoscope, the bronchoscope is a small, straight metal tube, inserted through the mouth. It has a fine electric bulb at the end and breathing holes near the end. Through this the operator can look inside the stomach or lungs, or operate safety pin closers, forceps or other instruments for handling small objects. A bronchoscope for a baby is hardly larger than a straw.

Dr. Jackson's records show that formerly 90 per cent of the children who had hard foreign objects in their stomachs or lungs, died. Today 98 per cent of the patients live. He has found ticks, whistles, jackknives, buttons, and scores of other small objects in the lungs and stomachs of children. Recently he removed a glass bead from the right bronchus of the five year old son of a missionary, brought to him 12,000 miles from India.

Dr. Jackson is professor of bronchoscopy and esophagoscopy at Jefferson Medical college and the postgraduate school of Pennsylvania.

The Garden

BREAKING UP CLAY SOILS

Clay soils, properly prepared, are as fine a medium as there is for growing onions, peas, carrots and parsnips. Clays and naturally wet soils are notoriously difficult to handle when it comes to spading and breaking them up. In each case the efficient method of getting the soil into shape necessitates digging both the top soil and the subsoil to have the job done once for all. It really should start in the fall to lighten the task and it might be a good idea to make a note of this time-honored method of expert gardeners who have a clay problem.

Trenches are dug across the garden about a spade deep and two feet apart, the tumps are tossed in ridges alongside and left there. Mature or compost is placed in the bottom of the trenches and dug in and left for the winter. In the spring the weathered lumps in the ridges are easily knocked to pieces, thrown in the trenches and the space they occupied dug as thoroughly as possible for the season's planting and then treated in the same manner in the fall. In two seasons clay soil handled in this manner loses its terror. It is a slow process but it pays.

The quickest method is to dig in a liberal supply of rotted stable manure or compost and incorporate it as thoroughly as possible with the soil in the digging this spring. It will produce fine crops. The addition of sand and ashes in liberal quantities will help lighten clay soil but ground limestone is superior to either, because the lime has a chemical effect upon the fine clay particles, causing them to gather in coarse particles and thus breaking up their "clotting."

Clay soil is good soil for a garden and the fact that it looks yellow and forbidding need not deter anybody who is willing to treat it. One can get extra fine crops of some of the vegetables in soil of this character. A good garden in any soil requires work and after the beginning clay is no worse than others.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit sections, cereal, thin cream, fried dried beef with scrambled eggs, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Ring of spinach with creamed oyster, Boston brown bread and butter sandwiches, sliced hot house tomatoes, coconut cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Navy bean soup, toast sticks, tuna fish and hard cooked egg salad, bran rolls, peach Bavarian cream, sunshine cake, milk, coffee.

Small children should not be served dried beef suggested for breakfast and orange juice is preferred to grapefruit. They may have plain scrambled eggs, and of course, cereal and toast. Coconut cookies are delicious with the afternoon cup of tea.

COCONUT COOKIES
Two eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup thick sour cream, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup canned shredded coconut, 3 cups flour, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Beat eggs until light, gradually beating in sugar. Add coconut, salt and half the cream. Mix thoroughly and stir in flour and vanilla, using as much flour as works in easily. Dissolve soda in remaining cream and add to mixture. Stir until perfectly smooth and add remaining flour. Chill thoroughly and cut in slices or roll on a well-floured molding board into a sheet about 1/4 of an inch thick. Cut with cookie cutter first dipped in flour and bake on an oiled and floured sheet in a moderate oven. The cookies can be sprinkled with finely chopped canned coconut just before baking if more coconut is liked.

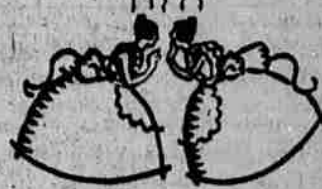
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
