SUGGESTS NAMES FOR 5 STREETS

L. H. Russell Compiles List—Commission to Hear Ideas Tonight

With the announcement by the city commission of the plan to rename the lettered streets of the city after pioneers and early settlers here L. H. Russell, who is well acquainted with the town history, has made a list suggesting names for the first five letters in the alphabet, which he will present to the commission for their consideration.

For A, he suggests the name of Arnold, Green Arnold being a pioneer stockman of this vicinity. He suggests three names, Bay, Brown or Baker for B avenue, all three men being pioneers here. David Bay, who is now living in Portland, was very active in city affairs here at one time, being a member of the city council for many years and also mayor for several terms. M. Baker was an attorney during the early days in La Grande and Ben Brown built the first house in the city of old La Grande.

For C, avenue he suggests the name Clark, J. P. Clark, being one of the first merchants here. He was the father of Jeanette Clark, at one time a teacher in the school here, and Mrs. Gilbert Barron, of this city.

He suggests Deal as the name for D avenue, after W. R. Deal, an outstanding figure in the stock raising industry here many years ago and active in county affairs. W. R. Deal was the father of Miss Susan Deal, teacher in the Central school here at the present time. The Deal home, where she now lives, is located at the corner of D avenue and Fourth street.

E avenue, according to him, should be named Ellsworth, after Stukley Ellsworth, father of Mrs. Harriet Macdonald, and grandfather of Mrs. Jean Birnie, prominent in La Grande during pioneer days.

Receipts from business licenses, excise, charity or taxes exacted from insurance and other incorporated companies and from sales tax on gasoline, while those from non-business licenses comprise chiefly taxes on motor vehicles and amounts paid for hunting and fishing privileges.

The increased percentage shown in 1926 for business and non-business licenses was due, principally to great receipts from the sales tax on gasoline and from motor vehicle licenses.

Indebtedness—The net indebtedness (funded or fixed debt less sinking fund assets) of Oregon on Sept. 30, 1926, was \$28,110,362, or \$43.61 per capita. In 1925 the per capita debt was \$47.98, and in 1917, 66c. **Assessed Valuations**—For 1926 the assessed valuation of property in Oregon subject to ad valorem taxation was \$1,084,537,619; the amount of state taxes levied was \$5,651,170; and the per capita levy, \$3.76. In 1925 the per capita levy was \$3.37, and in 1917 \$3.15.

The police estimated that the death list at Amino would reach more than 1,000.
