Film Version of Verne's Novel Coming to Arcade

"Michael Strogoff," coming here to the Arcade theater Thursday for a three-day run, was given considerable praise by Bob Swayze, in the Oregon Journal. His review follows:

Tremendous, a more or less over-used and outworn adjective, is the only word which gives some accurate conception of the magnificent scale with which Jules Verne's famous novel, "Michael Strogoff," has been brought to the screen, and now showing at the Columbia theater. It is no more than fair to say that there are scenes in it which equal any of those projected in "The Big Parade." What is more, the film stands on its own merits. There are no names in it with which to hypnotize one's better judgment. It was made by a French company and in it are starred European actors scarcely known in America except through reports. In spite of this, there are situations so tense, so thrilling, that audiences are forced into spontaneous applause. At other times the heart is gripped to the fullness of tears. One of these scenes is when Strogoff's eyesight is being put out by the application of a red hot sword. Another breathless point is the fierce fight between Strogoff and the traitor general. I have seen nothing on the screen more thrilling or ferocious than this encounter. Ivan Masikine, the European star, reaches every emotional height demanded of him as Strogoff in this scene as well as in many others.

Nathalie de Kovenko, a pretty girl, furnishes the love motive in the role of Nadia.

Quiet Russian inn, peopled with dancers, singers and accordion players, wretched peasant huts built for animals to live in, gorgeous state balls staged with the extravagance of an Oriental potentate, and lastly, the savage camp of the Tartar Khan—are all brought out in opulent proportions.

This Tartar camp is the most extraordinary sequence ever seen in

motion pictures. Brilliantly tinted, gaudy banners, thick, rich oriental rugs, jewel-trimmed costumes, these are all shown in their original colors by the new French stencil process which is said to be vastly superior to any colored film ever before shown.

The little brown dancers dressed in the costumes which only the East could conceive, strive to please the great Khan. They dance to the music of a strange hand playing on great potato shaped drums, long, hollow and strange wind and string instruments. The musicians with their fierce black mustaches, high fur turbans, and barbarically colored robes would frighten less hardy entertainers.

The Khan's harem is there, too, while the Khan himself rivals Nero in his splendor. His robes of thick silk are studded with gems.

In startling contrast to these scenes is the brilliant court ball in the Khan's palace. Here, too, the scene is in color, but this time the colors are the soft, shades of a highly civilized society. The pinks, whites, pale blues and pale greens of the ermine gowns are set off by the brave uniforms of the men.
