QUINCY, Ill., Mar. 11. (AP)—Radio fans will hear something akin to snail tonight when 40 "duckers" including five women entries compete in a duck calling contest, the first of its kind ever held.

A silver trophy engraved "Exceptional Duck Caller of America" will go to the winner. The contest, sponsored by the Frank Walton league and the chamber of commerce, will be put on the air by station WTAD of Quincy.

Mrs. Ellen Barnum, a widow who supports her five children by her pig farm near Beason, N. Overcome by remorse, Mrs. Barnum was unable to explain the incident, saying that she had meant merely to prod her son reprovingly and momentarily forgot that she had been cutting cake, that she still held the knife in her hand. Although a charge of assault was entered against her, Mrs. Barnum was released on parole so that her farm work might not be interrupted.

5 WOMEN STRIKE; SCORN CABBAGE

Prisoners in Florida Become Disorderly When Candy Is Excluded

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Mar. 11. (AP)—Shouts and curses from the "stony loneliness" cells of the city prison farm through the night gave evidence that a tear bomb and a night of solitary confinement have not persuaded five women prisoners of the error of their ways. The women became disorderly yesterday when cabbage was included in prison fare and candy excluded.

Captain Byron Parker, farm superintendent, said today he didn't know exactly what he would do about the case. The five women, led by Laura Upholgreve, reported member of the Ashley Mobley gang, Everglades outlaws of a few years ago, abandoned a sixth at the supper hour yesterday when she evaded a willfulness to work and barricaded themselves in the sleeping quarters.

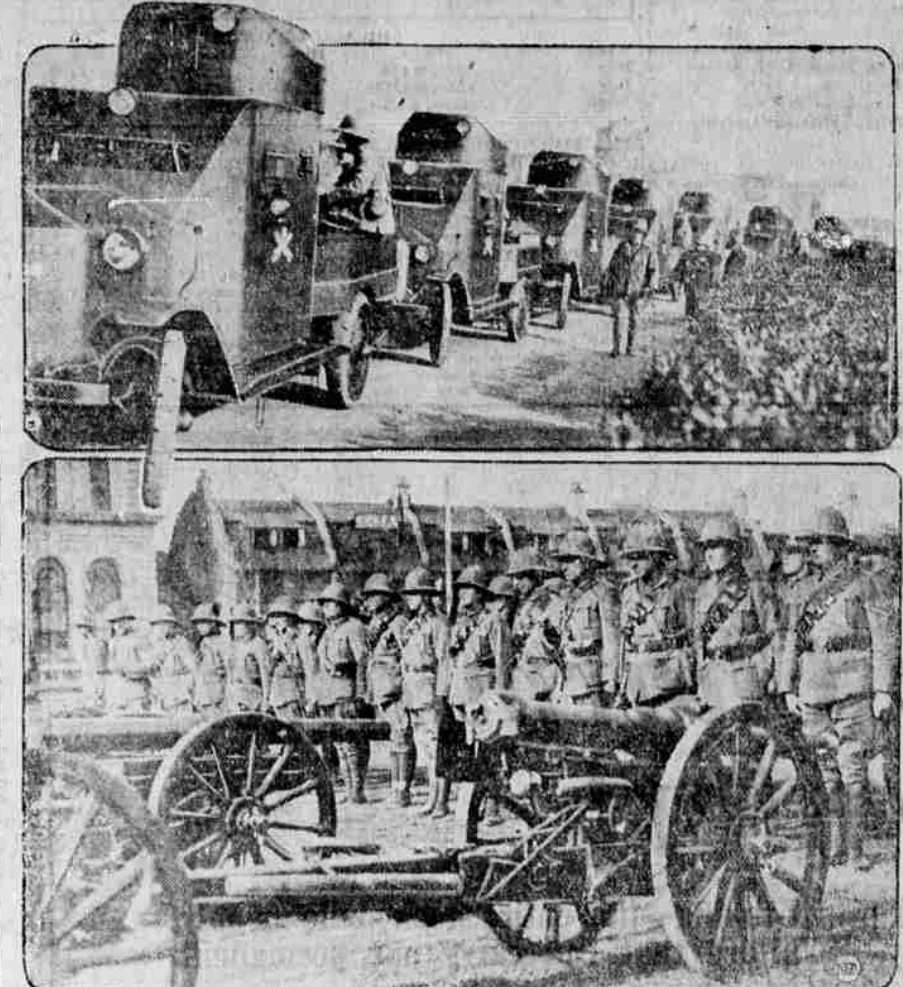

Huge Merger Deal Closed in New York

NEW YORK, Mar. 11. (AP)—The New York Sun says today that a merger involving the Keith-Albee and Orpheum vaudeville circuits and the Pathe Exchange, Inc., and the Producers Distributing corporation, which controls the output of G. B. DeMille motion pictures, was consummated last night. The merger is reported to involve millions of dollars. Details were not announced.

Banking interests, said to be associated in the merger were Bly and company, Merrill-Lynch company and Jeremiah Milbank. Bly and company recently were reported to have acquired an interest in Pathe, and the Keith-Albee and Orpheum circuits took over half interest in the De Mille company a year ago.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Mar. 11. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The demand for wool is strong while prices are barely steady at the local market. Fundamental conditions in the market have changed particularly favoring, on the outlook is regarded with more or less optimism. Steadily, the trade waits for a more positive development in the market for heavyweight goods."

"In the west there has been little new development. Some hold over lots in the bright wool market are available at around 25 cents."
