

FIND COAL VEIN NEAR VALE, ORE

Succor Creek Yields Samples That Burn Well and Appear First Class

VALE, Ore., Mar. 11.—A coal vein, lying in Succor creek, near Jordan Valley, recently brought to some coal samples taken from a mine on the property. The coal is in two veins which will burn well together. They are about 10 inches thick. The vein is in about 10 feet. The coal burns well and has the appearance of first class product.

Indications of valuable coal deposits have been noticed in various places near Succor creek for years. Many places have been panned up and burned, but most of the coal beds lie so near the water, no one has ever tried to develop a mine. Years ago in Coal Mine basin a shaft was sunk and a fairly good quality of coal was dug out. Several freight loads were hauled to Caldwell but the water raised in the shaft and work was stopped. A few years ago another mine was opened

in Texas basin and several loads were sold, but lack of capital to develop this mine resulted in abandonment.

These coal indications are located quite close together. In time rich mines may develop.

Klamath Falls Files Protest On Land Charge

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 11 (AP) — A Washington special dispatch says a vigorous protest from Klamath Falls against the supplemental construction charge of \$51 an acre placed by the bureau of reclamation on Tule Lake lands embraced in the Klamath irrigation district was laid yesterday before Woodrow Mead, commissioner of reclamation, by Senator McNary and Representative Slatoff of Oregon.

The Oregon members of congress were informed by J. H. Carnahan, Klamath Falls attorney, that federal land banks had refused further loans on the Tule Lake lands until the construction charge is reduced to \$40 per acre. They told commissioner Mead that the federal government could maintain good faith with the Tule Lake settlers only by reducing the construction charge to \$37.50 per acre in accordance with the report of the board of survey and adjustment.

Mead expects to visit Oregon reclamation projects in May and will stop at Klamath Falls enroute to take up the Tule Lake matter with the officials of the irrigation district.

Green Prunes Frozen in Barrels Offer New Outlet For Growers

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 11.—Green prunes, frozen in barrels like strawberries, from a market which opened up to a small extent last year, promises to be one of the big outlets for Oregon prunes, according to information developing at present. One concern in Portland last year barreled 1300 barrels of green prunes for an English buyer, who started the proposition under way. The prunes are cut in halves, pitted and then frozen in the barrels fresh and held for the market.

The concern in Portland which handled this deal is confident that it will grow into one of the largest factors in the prune business. The experiment, it is stated, was a success in every way last year, the prunes kept, were shipped to England and sold on basis which resulted in a profit and the English buyer has given assurance it was so successful he will be back this year bigger and stronger than ever for more fresh prunes.

According to him there is an enormous potential market for the

fresh prunes handled in this fashion which can be developed gradually and that the Oregon prune is an ideal prune for handling in this manner.

The barreled strawberry was worked up within comparatively a few years in this section from a very small beginning, smaller than the initial efforts along the prune line, into one of the biggest factors in the berry situation in the Salem section. The strawberry barreling business continues to grow here every year and last year more firms were engaged in the barreling of strawberries than any time in history. If the prune barreling proposition proves as successful as the English buyer believes it will, there is little question that Salem would become the center of the industry, as it has become the center of the strawberry barreling industry, and probably would result in a much larger volume than the strawberry proposition because of the wide English trade that could be developed, as well as the possibilities in the American trade.

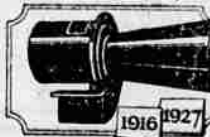

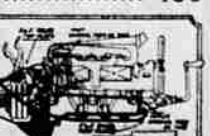
