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SUCCESS GREETINGS FIVE BIG STARS

Major Leagues Find This Quintet Playing Stellar Role for a Decade

By Billy Evans Ten years back, five of the outstanding stars of the major leagues were the following well-known athletes:

Tyrus Raymond Cobb, greatest ball player of all time, holder of so many records it would take a large-size volume to properly chronicle them.

Eddie Collins, generally regarded as the premier of all second basemen, past, present or future.

Hogers Hornsby, biggest figure in the National League, the only player to threaten Cobb's batting feats.

Tris Speaker, recognized everywhere as the greatest outfielder in the history of the game, also capable of doing other things well, aside from fielding.

George Sisler, the last word as a first baseman and a great batter as well.

Managerial Fad Basking in the spotlight each day because of their extraordinary ability, it seemed that all five were enjoying about all the good things possible in baseball.

Then overnight there came a fad of making managers out of star players, due either to a scarcity of leaders, or the belief that the players might be equally successful as executives.

Tris Speaker paved the way for the run on star player-managers. It didn't take Speaker long to demonstrate his worth. In what was really his second year, he won a pennant and a world championship for Cleveland.

Then came the appointment of Cobb at Detroit, Sisler in St. Louis, Collins at Chicago, Hornsby in Washington and Hornsby.

Successful Careers On the whole, I would say the stars have met with more than ordinary success as pilots. Three of them have led pennant winners and world champions, Stanley Harris at Washington has two flags to his credit.

Yet, I have always doubted the wisdom of the appointments, admitting there are exceptions to every rule.

While the play of the stars has been good, considering the added responsibilities of manager, still most of them have suffered a certain deterioration in their standard of play.

Perhaps the most striking falling off was noted in the work of Rogers Hornsby last season. While he played most of the year with a lame back, he frankly admits the managerial woes and the strain of realizing you were piloting a club that had a chance, was a greater handicap.

Change in Style The fall of star players as managers was an overnight affair; how it appears to have faded out as quickly as it arrived.

The five stars I have enumerated at the beginning of this article are no longer managers. All have been demoted since the close of last season for various reasons.

Stanley Harris alone remains of the late appointments, and this

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Island Students Refuse to Wear Native Clothes

MANILA, Mar. 14 (AP)—Investigators for Governor General Wood who were sent to Baguio recently to determine the cause of a riot among students, reported today that the trouble was the outcome of a disagreement over men's fashions.

During the riot James A. Wright, principal of the farm school at Baguio, was tied to a post by 120 angry students and a lively mixup followed when some of Wright's friends interposed to rescue him.

The investigators declared the uprising came as the result of Wright's order that students must wear sweaters instead of trousers while working in the fields. The students, mostly members of the Ifugao tribe, which has worn nothing but awestrings for centuries, resented the order.

The inquiry developed that the students had taken a liking to the new fangled idea of trousers while the school principal figures sweaters were good enough for ordinary work.

The rioters were temporarily suspended at once. What will be done further than that now is up to Governor Wood.

CHICAGO, Mar. 14 (AP)—Love letters and letters of thanks allied three Mexican murderers to escape from Will county jail, Joliet, Saturday, officials believed today after obtaining confessions, seizing letters and discovering a prison key diary. Three American killers, companions of the Mexicans, failed to get away.

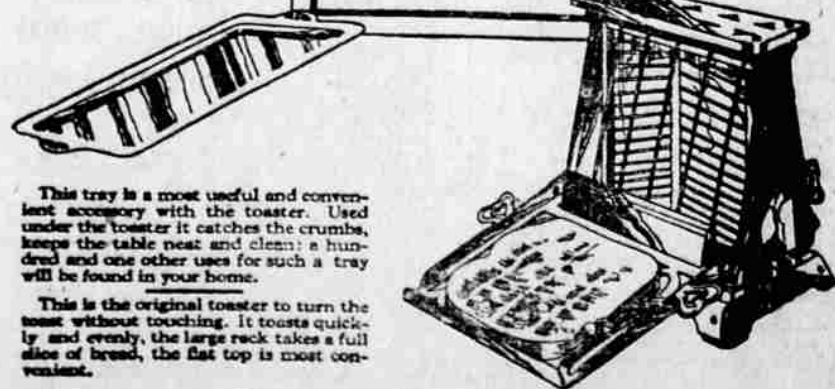
C. P. Liner Collides With Jinsho Maru
