UNION TAXES**Statements to Property
Holders to Be in Mails
About April 1LA GRANDE CITY
TAX RATE IS 22.9Union Again Tops List—
Total Value of All Tax-
able Property in Coun-
ty Is \$25,756,352.Tax receipts are now being pre-
pared in the sheriff's office of the
county court house and will be in
the mail by April 1, allowing plenty
of time before May 5, when the
first half of the tax is due and
should be paid.After that time a small rate of
interest is charged on the unpaid
taxes until they are paid. The second
half to be paid, Nov. 5, when, if
not paid, the taxes will become
delinquent. If not paid within a
month from that time, Dec. 5, ad-
ditional interest will be charged.The first half of the 1927 taxes,
based on the assessment roll of
1926, amounts to \$434,790.48, the
total for the year being \$869,-
580.95 which is a large figure than
last year. The total value of tax-
able property in the county being
\$25,756,352.Of the total tax for the year
\$461,028.70 is the general tax, in-
cluding state tax, general fund,
school fund, library fund, road
fund, indigent soldier's fund, mar-
ket road fund, road bond interest
and road bond redemption.

Cities and Towns

The sum of \$147,684.09 of the
total is special taxes levied by
cities and towns. La Grande has
the highest valuation of any city in
the county, \$5,196,682, and the tax
is \$116,943.92, the rate being 22.9
mills.Union has the highest tax rate of
any town in the county; the rate
being 27.7 mills and the valuation
being \$17,575. The tax amounts to
\$4,811.59. North Powder is
second with a rate of 21.9 mills,
the valuation being \$294,244 and
the tax \$6,444.38.The rate at Summerville is 11.9
mills, the valuation \$23,620 and the
tax \$2,810.81; at Elgin the rate is
2.5 mills, the valuation \$409,832
and the tax \$1,024.59; Imbler, tax-
ing 6.3 mills, valuation \$135,796, tax
\$855.51; Cove, rate 8.3 mills, valua-
tion \$163,352, tax \$1,355.82 and
Island City, rate 6.4 mills, valua-
tion \$124,219 and tax \$795.The special tax levied by schools
is also higher at Union than any
other place in the county, the rate

Kenney company, which has the
contract for the installation of La
Grande's first street lighting im-
provement district, broke concrete
this morning on the sidewalk in
front of the telephone company's

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SHANGHAI IS
IN PROGRESS**Heavy Fighting Reported
to the West and North-
west of CityGENERAL CHANG
WOULD SELL OUTAmerica Investigating the
Preble Incident — Pro-
test Likely If Chinese
Were in Wrong.SHANGHAI, Mar. 16. (AP)—
Heavy fighting is reported west
and northwest of Shanghai, where
the Cantonese are driving toward
the railway which connects Chang
Tsung-Chang with his base, Tai-
nan, in Shantung province.Telegraphic communication be-
tween Nanking and Peking, Anhui
province, is interrupted, but
responsible quarters do not believe
Peking has been captured by the
southerners, as claimed by the
Kuomintang press in Peking. It
is believed, however, that Nanking
is seriously menaced. Both Nan-
king and Peking are on the rail-
way.To the southeast, along the west-
ern shore of Lake Taihu, near Ning
a battle is reported under way,
with no indication as to the prob-
able outcome.Chang Tsung-Chang is concentrat-
ing Shantung troops at Suo-
chow and Changchow, respectively
east and north of the lake, to pre-
vent cutting of the railway there.CHANG SEEKS \$5,000,000
LONDON, Mar. 16. (AP)—With
the nationalist forces in China
keeping up their intensive struggle
to surround and isolate the Nan-
king position from Shanghai, com-
ing a report from Shanghai that Gen-
eral Chang Tsung-Chang, the
Shantungese, defender of that city,
has offered for a large money con-
sideration to evacuate the zone of
actual hostilities.Shang desires about \$5,000,000
for evacuation and maintenance of
his army in the province of
Westminster. If the amount
is not forthcoming, it is asserted,
he intends if necessary to retreat
upon Shanghai itself, thus bringing
the prize city of the Orient into the
struggle for mastery between the
southerners and southerners.
According to the correspondent the
Chinese merchants in Shanghai are
unable or unwilling to raise the
huge sum demanded.To Remove Women
Preparations have been made in
Nanking to remove the women and
children from the zone of close ap-
proach to the Cantonese.A promise has been made by
General Ho Ying-Yin, nationalist
commander in the province of Che-
kiang, which borders on the south
of the province of Kiangsu, in which
Shanghai is situated, that he will
not attempt by force to take the
international settlement in Shang-
hai, says another dispatch to the
Westminster Gazette. He has prom-
ised also to fully protect settle-

And Gets 60-Day
Term in Prison**TORONTO, Ont., Mar. 16. (AP)—
Ernest V. Sterry, editor, found
guilty yesterday of blasphemous
libel against the deity, was sen-
tenced to 60 days in jail.Judge Courtwright, in pronounc-
ing sentence, also recommended
that Sterry be deported after serv-
ing the sentence.Sterry was convicted of "scur-
rious and indecent, indecent and
blasphemous" criticism of God, the
scriptures and the Christian reli-
gion. He may not protest depor-
tation proceedings if they are in-
stituted by his counsel. He has resided
in Canada 16 years.His defense in the trial was that
his criticism was directed not
against the current conceptions of
the Christian god, but against the
"mythological" conception of the
ancient "Jewish god," "an infidel
party," as described in the old test-
