Smaller Box For Apples Planned

Home Pointers

Repeated experiments in Oregon have indicated that Grains alfalfa is the best variety for this state. It appears harder, more resistance to disease, better able to withstand unfavorable conditions, a better yielder and longer lived, and is therefore recommended by the experiment station as the standard variety.

In western Oregon application of land plaster is important aid in establishing stands of alfalfa each spring, reports the experiment station. These applications are best put on early while there is still rainfall to wash the material into the soil. March and early April.
