CUBE BUTTER IS LOWER IN PRICE

Current Receipts Remain Unchanged—Hogs, Veal Plentiful

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 16 (AP).—Under the influence of lower prices in the California butter market, few Portland dairy exchange prices of cube butter established cube extras, standards and prime firsts at half cent lower for today and current receipts remain unchanged. Extra cubs are 1 cent lower and mediums have dropped two cents on the dairy exchange. Prices for firsts and current receipts remain unchanged.

Current receipts of country dressed hogs and veal were plentiful this morning while demand was slightly slower than usual. A few prime hogs moved for 17 cents but buyers were demanding the best and offered a half cent less in many instances. Veal sold for 17 and 17½ cents in the early trading.

HARVEST NEARS PEAK

ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 16 (AP).

The broccoli harvest is now nearing the peak with four or five cars being loaded daily. Forty-seven cars have been shipped out of Roseburg and Elsiehowe so far this season, while five have moved out of Hiddle and one out of Myrtle Creek, making a total of 53 for the county. The cold weather has been holding back the harvest, stretching it out over a longer period than has been anticipated. It was estimated that the peak would be reached before the middle of the month, but at present there are only about four cars daily, while the crop is not yet quite fully harvested. Estimates now place the total number of cars for the season at between 100 and 150, the recent frosts having caused a loss of about one-half the crop. A few warm days will bring the remainder of the crop on in a hurry, but a continuation of the cold weather will extend the harvest for several weeks.

Market Weak in Morning; Rally Sends Issues Up

NEW YORK, Mar. 16 (By the Associated Press).—The stock market displayed another complete reversal of form today, selling off sharply during the morning and then rallying briskly in the afternoon.

General Motors was again the market leader, pushing through 176 to a new high record for the present stock. Dupont touched a new high around 265, while National Lead and Matheson Alkali were each bid up about five points above last week's closing quotations.

Extensive analyses developed in the southern districts issued when these stocks were subjected to bear attacks, the "A" dropping 7 1/2 points to 24 and the "B" 2 1/4 to 8 1/2, both new low records for all time.

In the railroad group, the best gains were made by issues of an investment character. The closing was strong. The holdings of American Telephone which jumped over 8 points to 165 1/2, the best price in 29 years, caused a rapid rise in other investment stocks, both U. S. Steel and General Motors getting to new peaks at 162 1/2 and 177 1/2, respectively. Case Threshing Machine, All American Cables and Eastman Kodak also rose three to four points. Total sales approximated 1,200,000 shares.
