LONGVIEW SEEKS SHARE OF TRADE

Portland Has No Monopoly in Columbia River Area Report

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 19. (AP)—That Portland has no monopoly on the trade of the Columbia river hinterland, and that Longview is going after its share of this business, was declared by Wesley Vanderbrook of Longview, Wash., one of the promoters of a private toll bridge across the river between Longview and Rainier, Ore., at the concluding hearing of the bridge plans today before a government tribunal.

"It seems to me that this business should be shared by all Columbia river ports and we are sure going after our share," said Vanderbrook. "We have railroad facilities and rates on a parity with Portland in the district north of Snake river, and we are going after parity rates south of Snake river. It does not seem to me that Portland can claim all the trade of the Columbia basin."

"Longview is one of the largest single developments in the northwest in recent years, and has benefited the northwest and Portland by adding new wealth and new population. What we need here is more development, and the more development we have at Longview, the better it will be for Portland. We are not obstructionists, we are simply saying that we are constructionists and want any statements to the contrary."

Direct to his office, many saw the blood from his wounds and men broke into hardware stores and obtained shotguns and ammunition. "Tear Bombs Used" Several hundred members of the mob had forced their way to the second story of the city hall and were being held at bay with tear bombs by the city and county officers when a group of the 11th cavalry, a local national guard unit, appeared on the scene. Bricks, rocks and other missiles were hurled at the officers. Smith was taken from room to room in the city hall and finally he was shoved into a elevator on the building while the officers invited the mob to search the jail.

At 4 o'clock this morning troops A and G of 10th and Yates Center arrived to aid officers. Detachments were patrolling the main streets and the negro section today.

ONCE A DIABETIC—ALWAYS A DIABETIC—BUT DIABETICS CAN NOW LIVE NORMAL LIVES

Member Gorman Memorial Inst. Diabetes is a chronic disease of the pancreas (called sweetbread in domestic animals) from which more than two million people in the United States are suffering.

The job of the pancreas is to produce a secretion for digestive purposes. This is poured into the intestines and, mixing with other digestive fluids, bile, gastric juices, and intestinal fluids, renders the food substances of all kinds available for absorption by the body.

In addition to this secretion the pancreas produces a substance known as insulin. The function of insulin is to convert the absorbed carbohydrates, which have been changed into glucose in the process of digestion, into available sugars for body consumption and uses. When one has diabetes there are changes in the insulin producing tissues of the pancreas.

Diabetes does not develop overnight. It may easily be treated in the early stages and it may easily be discovered by urinalysis. The least evidence of the disease must be treated energetically. Untreated cases show a high mortality and, with the use of insulin, the possibility of a very greatly diminished mortality, especially among those who would die in the first year of the disease.

People who are overweight must especially be on guard against diabetes. Not only urinalysis, but blood tests to determine the level of sugar are wise, as frequently disease may be checked and controlled by such knowledge. A physician's duty is to warn the obese among his patients of their susceptibility to the disease, and prevention may occur in many such cases.

Every case of eruptive contagious disease should have careful urinalysis before being discharged. All relatives of a diabetic should recognize the possibilities of heredity and submit to more frequent urinalysis than the average. It is true also that once a diabetic always a diabetic, so that regular observation for the rest of life is necessary. Normal weight should be an axiom.

Etternal vigilance is the price of liberty for the diabetic patient, and every day offers to him great opportunity for prolonged life and comfort in the advancing knowledge of the medical profession of the treatment of this disease. When diabetes is discovered, it is advisable for the patient to enter a hospital where his carbohydrate tolerance can be determined with scientific precision. Many times it is possible to prevent a diet which will be found sufficient to nourish the patient without the use of insulin, which is injected into the patient just beneath the skin.

Insulin is not a cure for diabetes. It is simply a means to provide a diabetic with necessary food without causing sugar to appear in the urine. In diabetic cases of even moderate severity, it is necessary to weigh the food taken, so as to prevent eating an amount beyond the ability of the patient's natural tolerance or the combination of natural tolerance and insulin "burn up."

Canada Ready to Confer With U. S.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19. (AP)—The announcement of Premier Mackenzie King in the Canadian parliament that Canada was ready to arrange a reciprocal treaty with the U. S. to govern the exchange of coast products and fish created lively interest today in Washington, but those in authority were reluctant to comment regarding more complete exposition of the premier's views. It was held in some quarters that under the tariff law the president could lower duties on coast products and fish merely for purposes of reciprocal trade agreements.

BARON MONCHEUR POPULAR IN LONDON

Her marriage to Baron Moncheur took place while her father, General Powell Clayton of Arkansas, was American minister to Mexico and Baron Moncheur was serving Belgium at the Mexican capital. Baron Moncheur was Belgian minister in Washington for many years after his marriage and was stationed in London as the chief representative of his government during the war.

Rainbow Chasers Disappointed at Weepah, Nevada

TONOPAH, Nev., Mar. 19. (AP)—Rainbow chasers who believe that shafts of gold may be picked up in the unworked claims of the Weepah gold fields are moving in here to be caught in the mirage of disappointment.

While skilled and experienced engineers and mining men moved about with the knowledge born of geobutake outfits, the territory beyond that gold may be found in Weepah, but not in plain sight. Word of the rush for locations in the Weepah fields has reached New York where two astute daughters of Father Knickerbocker, accustomed to dealing with head waiters, telegraphed their reservations for claims today. They asked that a few be reserved for them until their arrival a few days hence.

The young women, whose names were not made public, also asked that they be furnished with a handbook of directions and other literature on how claims are located. Many arrivals at Weepah came with the idea they can gather all the gold they need to make them comfortable by walking around the hills.
