LOVER MURDERS TO FREE WOMAN

Husband Beaten to Death So as to Free Wife to Marry Sweetheart

NEW YORK, Mar. 21 (AP)—Mrs. Ruth Snyder today asserted to the police that Henry Judd Gray, now under arrest in Syracuse, had murdered her husband, Albert Snyder, art director of a magazine, in order that she might be free to marry him.

Press despatches from Syracuse said that Gray was in that city last night.

According to the alleged confession, Mrs. Snyder said that Gray was concealed in their home in Queens Village, when she, her husband and their 2-year-old daughter Lorraine, returned early Sunday morning from a card party.

Gray, according to Mrs. Snyder, beat Snyder to death and then wound a picture wire around his throat. After the murder Gray bound Mrs. Snyder in order to throw an aspect of burglary over the crime.
