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NEW STRIKE AT WEEPAH, NEVADA

Flurry of Excitement Permeates Atmosphere of Gold Boom Town

TONOPAH, Mar. 22 (AP)—Another flurry of excitement—news of a second gold strike—permeated Weepah today. Owners of four claims a mile and a quarter from the camp were rushing away excitedly showing their new find running as high as \$50 a pound and croppings running to \$125.

Several hours before rumors of the new strike were confirmed, late arrivals began packing up and sneaking out into the hills on underground information that another strike had been made. Until last night the location was kept secret.

M. Barnes, foreman of the Tonopah Mining company, made the location known to a 14-foot ledge on his claim and then moved with three adjoining claims to avoid conflict when he found he was overlapped. The assay showed both gold and silver.

Lure of Gold Strong—The lure of gold is continuing to draw the seekers from far distant points. Among the latest arrivals is H. Semaria, coffee planter from San Salvador, who announces his intention of buying claims if he can find something with reasonable promise of development.

And there are other arrivals who apparently cannot buy anything regardless of development possibilities. One stamper drove in yesterday from Oregon with three cases of eggs in his driver after selling one case to raise money to buy gasoline to complete his journey.

High tension was felt in Tonopah awaiting the result of a series of conferences between Frank Horton, the directors of the Electric Gold Mines company and George Wingfield, banker and foremost financial man of the state. If Wingfield becomes linked with electric gold mines, it is felt the activities will increase many fold.

Tax Blanks Held Too Complicated

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 22 (AP)—Discussion of the form to be taken by the blank upon which taxpayers of the state are to be asked to make reports to the county assessors and the state tax commission, to carry into effect the recent act of the legislature for a readjustment of assessment valuations, occupied all of the time of the meeting of the representatives of the county assessors association this morning.

Objection was made that the form prepared by the tax commissioner at the request of the assessors was too detailed and complicated and the tax commission was instructed to prepare a simplified form for consideration at a further meeting at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The county assessors present at today's meeting were H. V. Welch of Multnomah; J. B. Coleman, of Jackson; J. P. Byers, of Coos; and C. L. Tallman, of Benton.

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U. S. MARINES TAKING PART IN SHANGHAI

There are also some Japanese troops occupying Japanese owned factories within the American area.

PI TO SURRENDER—SHANGHAI, Mar. 22 (AP)—It is officially announced that General Pi Shu-Chen, commander of the northern defense forces at Shanghai, has agreed to surrender. His capitulation was arranged yesterday in negotiations with Chang Kai-Shek, nationalist generalissimo.

The Kuomintang, or nationalist flag has been hoisted over General Pi Shu-Chen's headquarters, but many thousands of Shantungese soldiers in certain sections this evening were still unaware of the surrender.

Shooting, fires and looting continue in the Chapel quarter just outside the international settlement where mobs composed partly of Shantungese soldiers, partly of ordinary criminals and partly of nationalist gunmen, hold sway.

Dead Litter Streets—The streets are strewn with dead. In numerous cases the robbers have cut off women's fingers in order to obtain their rings.

Every place holding the promise of loot has been cleaned out, but the problem of the criminals is how to get away with their booty. As they leave the city they are met by swarms of entering looters, and bloody fights ensue.

Numerous innocent people are reported to have been killed in these affairs. The scenes in Chapel are indescribable. Blocked thoroughfares prevent the escape of the victims from the robbers.

Nothing is to be heard but the shots and the screams of women and children running hysterically to and fro. Many of the women have been stripped of their clothing by the soldiers in their wild hunt for loot.

Soldiers Loot Laden—Sometimes, loot-laden soldiers are protected by comrades with machine guns who think nothing of clearing the way down a crowded street by opening fire and killing scores of people.

But despite all this, it is declared that Chapel is merely undergoing the experiences that scores of other Chinese towns have had in the past during the present civil warfare.

A prominent missionary authority says tens of thousands of villagers in the provinces of Shensi, Yunnan, Kweichow, Honan and other parts of the country have been murdered in the last year.

Shall His Church—Tonight the sky was lighted by the fire spreading in the district. A three-story American struck the Presbyterian mission premises in the international settlement this afternoon and exploded. This caused much damage but there were no casualties.

The municipal court of the Shanghai international settlement, another American, chairman, Sterling Kesenden, today issued a long manifesto reiterating its intention to use all the resources at its disposal to retain control of the situation.

DEFINES AUTHORITY—SALEM, Ore., Mar. 22 (AP)—The state public service commission has the exclusive authority to require the furnishing of union terminals and to designate where they shall be located for the use of stage lines, according to an opinion forwarded to the public service commission by Attorney General L. Such action falls within the jurisdiction of the commission rather than within the police power of the municipalities where the stations may happen to be situated, according to the opinion.
