

CHRIST WORSHIP DUE TO INCREASE

So Says the Rev. William R. Reece, in Address Here Last Evening

"The gods we worship write their names on our foreheads," said the Rev. William R. Reece, speaking last evening at the Neighborhood club rooms on the subject "Scripture Teaching Concerning The Christ."

The god of the first Christians was Jesus and Jesus only, he continued, referring his audience to a recent work on this subject by



President M. C. C. of Columbia university, entitled "The God of The Early Christians," which bears testimony to an unwilling conviction on this subject.

Mr. Reece pointed out, however, that the New Christian church is returning to this original position and predicted that the day will come when humanity will receive around Christ as the manifested God, as the earth in the solar system revolves around the sun.

The testimony of the Bible, from Genesis to Revelations, was also pointed out, the speaker declaring that prophecy on this subject begins early in Genesis and increases in fullness through the centuries "until it reaches a glorious fulness in the Alpha and Omega of Revelations."

Questions were answered by the speaker until a late hour.

Tonight Mr. Reece speaks at 8 o'clock at the Neighborhood club rooms on "Scripture Teaching Concerning The Christ."

All who are interested in the Christian religion, regardless of denomination, are invited by Mr. Reece to attend. No admission charge is made.

National Guard Still Patrolling Coffeyville, Kan.

COFFEYVILLE, Kan., Mar. 22 (AP)—National guard troops have been ordered to remain on duty here for a week if necessary, to quell fears of renewed racial outbreaks.

Although the town has been quiet since the rioting Friday night in which four persons were injured, Governor Ben S. Paulsen reported the scheduled demobilization of Troop B, local cavalry contingent last night at the request of residents who declared a tense atmosphere still existed.

Soldiers continue to patrol the negro quarter and other sections of the city and today were assisting in a roundup of persons alleged to have led the mob which stormed the jail in an effort to remove a negro held in connection with an attack on two white high school girls.

CHILD PORTRAITURE REQUIRES PATIENCE

PARIS, Mar. 22—A new technique whereby children's portraits can be done rapidly in oils is being perfected in Paris by Ruth Pratt Hobbs well-known American painter. She is trying to make portrait sitting less burdensome for children.

"It is easy enough to do them in pastel," Mrs. Hobbs explained, "because in the medium one can work fast and not tire them with many long sittings. But pastels are treacherous. If married in any way, they must be redone completely. By the time the disaster is remedied, your young model has broken its nose or reached the awkward age and you have to start on an entirely new subject."

Youngsters who have met for Mrs. Hobbs include Albert J. Bevelidge, Jr., son of the Honorable statesman and Cornelia Olin Skinner, daughter of the actor. Her previous subjects include Irving Bacheller and Stephen Vincent Benet, the poet.

British Troops Kill 12 Chinese In Defending Settlement in Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Mar. 22 (AP)—British troops shot and killed at least 12 and wounded about a score of Shanghai Chinese when they made a fresh attempt to break through the barriers of the international settlement here late today.

Later the British admitted 300 Shanghai Chinese, who gave up their arms upon entering the settlement.

BRITISH REPULSE CHINESE

SHANGHAI, Mar. 22 (AP)—Firing their rifles in the air and yelling wildly, a mob of 2,000 Chinese troops from the ranks of the defeated northern army rushed the thin British cordon guarding the northern area of the international settlement here at 4:30 o'clock this morning.

A few scores succeeded in breaking through in the weakly held alleyways, but they were quickly rounded up and disarmed and turned into Chinese territory. The main body of the invaders were stopped by the British troops without firing. No British casualties were reported.

The attempt to invade the settlement followed a day of intermittent firing between the northern and Chinese guerrillas in the native Chapel district.

Much Sniping

There was continued sniping, mostly by nationalists riflemen, on the northeastern border of the settlement, and many shots penetrated the foreign quarter. The Japanese marines who are holding the eastern portion of this area are replying to the snipers shot for shot. The Japanese are posted on several high roofs, from which they watch for the snipers.

A small detachment of the Japanese battalion (British) holding the border near the northern railway station was fired on by a Shanghai soldier lying on the ground. After the third shot, the British commanding officer ordered his men to fire once. They did so and there were no more shots from the sniper.

Then a number of other nationalist marksmen opened up, and bullets whizzed past the barrier. The defenders, who had narrow escapes, did not reply for fear of hitting non-combatants. This incident was typical of the constant happenings along the northern and northeastern boundary of the settlement.

Nationalists Advancing

Nationalist troops are advancing along the railway around Shanghai in the direction of the Shanghai north station, the center of the remaining northern resistance. The two forces are expected to collide tonight or tomorrow.

It is believed the attempts of the nationalists to enter the international settlement are due to the approach of the nationalists, of whom several thousand moved along the railway on foot this morning.

The Cantonese troops are very unimpressive.

A large proportion of them are boys in their teens. They are ragged and dirty. But all wear the red and blue Kuomintang necktie. A group of officers seen by the correspondent, however, were comparatively dapper, in the Russian military style.

The correspondent witnessed the

passage of a train bearing a thousand or more of these troops this afternoon through the Jossfield station where there are British pickets on both sides of the railway. There were no signs of hostility, the Cantonese and the Cantonese cycling each other curiously at a range of a few feet, and commenting jeeringly.

As an example of the chaos outside the foreign settlements, northern forces are still running an armored train and firing on anything in sight between the north and northeastern stations. The white Russians in charge of the train apparently either are unaware that the Shanghai forces are not supposed to be fighting, or are afraid to leave the train.

Yesterday, Cantonese beheaded two white Russians within sight of the British guards at one of the barriers and stuck the heads on their bayonets, holding them aloft

amid the smiles of Chinese spectators.

The general strike is still spreading, and red intimidation is growing bolder. A party of men visited a railway foreman's home in the northwest district and superintended the removal of the rails.

The boatswain of a British ship received a note directing him to report at labor headquarters tonight to be flogged because he permitted wharf hands to scrub the deck of the vessel yesterday at the hour fixed for the strike. Should he fail to comply, he was warned, he and all his family would be shot.

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PEACHES HAS NO APPEAL CHANCE

Bride of Edward Browning Without Funds to Fight Decision

NEW YORK, Mar. 22 (AP)—Midnight having struck in the Cinderella life of "Peaches", the 16-year-old bride of Edward W. Browning today was separated from the riches and splendor to which she had become accustomed. No longer must her wealthy husband pay her \$200 a week alimony. In fact he need not pay a cent.

The Cinderella of fiction retired to her chimney corner. Peaches went to bed where she sobbed her disappointment over losing her separation suit against the 32-year-old wealthy real estate operator. He won his suit for separation.

No Funds For Appeal

Automatically deprived by the decision of the \$300 a week alimony she had been receiving since November, Peaches and her mother Mrs. Catherine Brown are without funds to pay for an appeal.

Henry Epstein, attorney for Peaches, said: "An appeal in such a case is very expensive business. Mrs. Browning has no money, and any money to finance the additional legal expenses would have to come from Mr. Browning."

Browning already has had to pay Epstein \$5,500.

Francis C. Dale, attorney for Browning, hailed the decision as establishing public sentiment and public justice "as bulwarks against the designing female of the species."
