

CUBE BUTTER IS DOWN HALF CENT

Onion Prices Advancing in Portland Market—Potatoes Unsettled

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 22 (AP).—Trading on the Portland daily exchange reduced the price of cube butter half cent lower on all grades except firsts for today's market. The new price on extras is 44½ cents; standards, 44c and prime firsts, 43½ cents. The San Francisco market continues to show the same weakening trend.

With onion shipments dwindling and small supplies remaining in hands of the producers, prices advanced today with dealers asking \$5.00 to \$5.50 per cwt. for best grades. New Texas onions coming to this market today in a car of mixed vegetables are quoted at \$7.50 per crate.
While entrance of California buyers into the local potato market has tended to unsettle price expectations of producers, to an upward trend, local buyers continue to hold firm on their offers for good 35 per cent grade mixed lots at from \$1.50 to \$1.60 in view of the continuing plentiful supply of fair stocks moving to markets up and down the coast. Prices and supplies of fresh meats, poultry and eggs held steady today as of yesterday, and trading was steady with a good portion of the egg receipts going into storage.

Wheat Slumps in Chicago Exchange

CHICAGO, Mar. 22 (AP).—Opening at ¼¢ decline to ¼¢ advance, Chicago wheat sagged somewhat but later showed slight gains all around. Corn and oats sagged with wheat, corn starting unchanged to ½¢ off and then scoring a general upturn. Provisions held steady.
Wheat closed 1½ @ 1½¢ net lower; corn 1 to 1½¢ down; oats, 1½ @ 1½¢ off, and provisions varying from ½¢ decline to 1½¢ advance.

Price Tendency In Wall Street Downward Today

NEW YORK, Mar. 22 (AP).—Pronounced reactionary tendency again developed in today's stock market. A few venturesome pools attempted at intervals to rally the general list by bidding up their favorites, but pressure of offerings became so large that bullish operations were either restricted or abandoned altogether.

Calling of about \$50,000,000 in bank loans, due to the return of income tax checks for payment, sent the call money from 4 to 4½ per cent, the first upturn in several weeks. Wall Street also appeared to be showing growing concern over intimations of further automobile price cutting and the prediction of the early elimination through merger or otherwise of some of the smaller companies. In the last five years more than 50 automobile companies have passed out of the picture.

Selling pressure was directed chiefly against issues which had proved vulnerable to bear attacks in the past few days. Houston Oil broke nearly 10 points and Du Pont, Baldwin, Consolidated Tilling "A," Stone, Sheffield, General Motors, Manhattan Electrical Supply and United Clear Stores needed extreme declines of four to nearly seven points.

Bulls, as a group, displayed a firmer undertone than the industrialists.
The closing was weak. Prices continued to fade away in the final hour with South Porto Rico Sugar, International Harvester, L. S. Cast Iron Pipe and United Drug leading the decline. Houston Oil had a temporary upward spurt on the retirement of short contracts and Lackawanna went up from 164 to 169½, the highest in six years, on predictions of an early distribution to shareholders. Total sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.

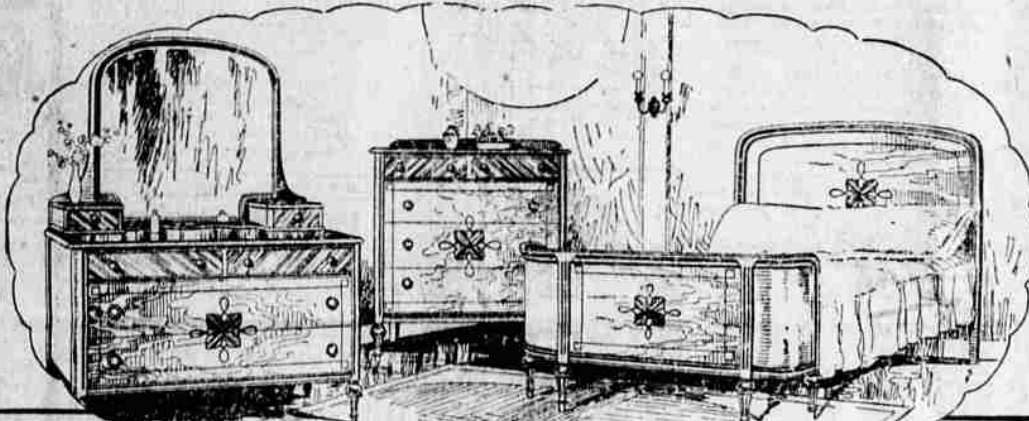

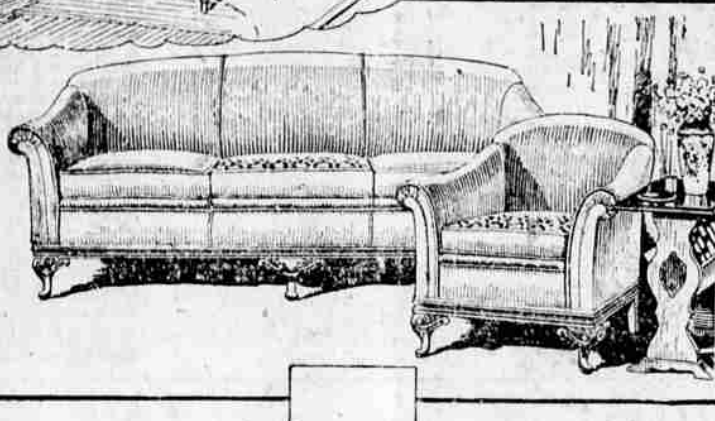
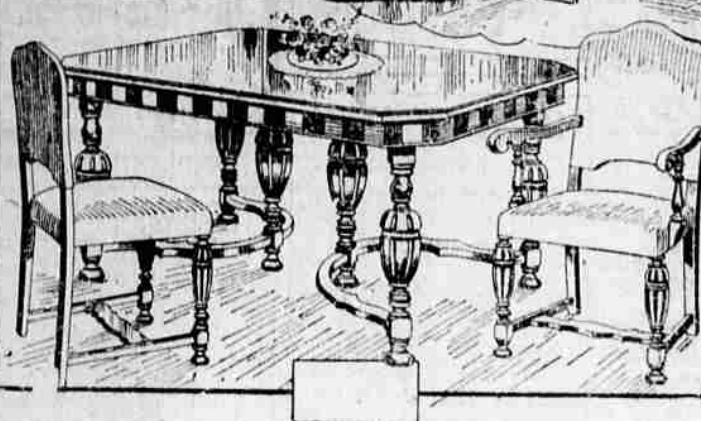
