HOLLYWOOD SUIT DISMISSED TODAY

Cross Complaint Fails—Victor McLaglen Testifies in Trial

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 23. (AP)—Lieutenant Gerard De Mereveaux, Hollywood fencing master, today scored in his \$25,000 damage suit against J. Stuart Blackton, motion picture director, charging a horse-whipping at the director's hands when Superior Judge Walter S. Gates dismissed a cross complaint in which Blackton asked \$50,000 damages from De Mereveaux charging assault against Paul H. Blackton, wife of the director.

The cross complaint was dismissed on motion of counsel for De Mereveaux. The court ruled that no cause of action was stated inasmuch as Mrs. Blackton and not Blackton was the person alleged to have been injured.

McLaglen Testifies
Victor McLaglen, motion picture player who said he was chief of police in Hagad before becoming an actor, declared from the witness stand that De Mereveaux's suit that the general reputation of the fencing master in Hollywood was "bad," McLaglen said he based his judgment on experience gained in police work in Egypt.

McLaglen testified that he had told Blackton of an alleged threat by De Mereveaux to take the life of Violet Blackton, daughter of the director, unless he was successful in his asserted suit for her hand.

The witness in response to a question during cross examination said he had been a professional prize fighter until 1912. He said he had fought professionally "for fun" since then.

Mrs. Nancy Crowley testified that she had found scratches and bruises on Mrs. Blackton when she arrived at the Blackton home the morning of the alleged horse-whipping. She said Mrs. Blackton's left arm was swollen and her fingers were "about the size of balloons."

She said she dressed the wounds.

Widow and Lover Facing Charges of Slaying Man

NEW YORK, Mar. 23. (AP)—Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray were indicted on charges of first degree murder by the Queen's county grand jury today for the slaying of the woman's husband, Albert Snyder.

abolition of unequal treaties, alteration of the status of the Shanghai international settlement, withdrawal of extraterritorial privileges for foreigners, disposal of the missionary schools and recovery of control of the postoffice and customs.

Will Maintain Order
General Pai Tsung-Hsi told the British, French and Japanese consuls generally today that he intended to maintain order.

The consul generals, who got in touch with the commander only after much difficulty, thus established relations with the new ruler of the Chinese districts of the city.

Clarence E. Gauss, did not participate in the conference, but it is understood he gave Pai Tsung-Hsi to understand that he would gladly confer with him after the nationalists had cleaned up the Chinese area north of the international settlement, where continued fighting has necessitated the evacuation of over 500 foreign residents.

Attack Pirates' Lair
HONGKONG, Mar. 23. (AP)—British warships attacked a Chinese pirates' lair in Blas Bay, near here, today and demolished their huts. There was no bloodshed. The aircraft carrier Hermes and two cruisers took part in the act and returned here tonight.

The action was to punish the pirates for a long series of depredations upon shipping and from Hongkong and to break up if possible their base of operations. Pirates looted the Indo-China Navigation company's steamer Hopang Monday night.

Quaint Farewell Message Is Sent
WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Mar. 23. (AP)—A quaint farewell message was sent by the Moori tribes to the Duke and Duchess of York, who sailed yesterday for Australia after visiting New Zealand. The message reads:

Reece Closes Lectures Here; Washington Next

Speaking Tuesday evening in the Neighborhood club rooms on "Emanuel Swedenborg, Prophet of This New Christian Age," the Rev. Wm. H. Reece, of Portland, devoted an hour to "merely the high spots" in the life and works of a man of whom it has been said, "with the exception of the Christ he (Swedenborg) was either the greatest genius or the greatest mad-man that ever lived."

Quoting Emerson, who termed him "one of the misanthropes and the maddest of the mad," the speaker briefly indicated something of the range of Swedenborg's thought. It was said that more than three quarters of a century have been required to edit and publish 15,000 and more pages of his scientific and philosophical works, 200 volumes in manuscript still remaining untouched. His writings on religion and the Bible and the life after death now total more than 16,000 printed pages.

Swedenborg lived in Stockholm, Sweden, between the years 1688 and 1772 and is gradually being recognized today by both the scientific and religious communities as one of the foremost pioneers in human thought. The speaker pointed out, before the American Revolutionary war he drew plans for a flying machine, a machine gun, a submarine, and the present day airplane. Swedenborg's real claim to distinction, however, was in his theological writings to which he devoted himself from the year 1743 until his death. These disclose the true nature of the Bible, showing it to be the inspired word of God and that it treats not of the history of any chosen people, but of the creation of the world, the relation of each God, man, and their relation to each other, man's regeneration and the life after death.

As a result of these lectures interest has been quickened in a group of La Grande residents some of whom meet for systematic study of the writings of Mrs. Haddon Gray under the leadership of Mrs. Haddon Gray. Mr. Reece leaves for Walla Walla tomorrow where the same series to be given, as also in Spokane, Seattle, and Olympia.

Officials Seek Dr. Knute Houck In Death Case

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23. (AP)—After the finding of a woman's body in the Potomac river today, Washington police telegraphed to the Madison, Wis., authorities to take into custody for investigation Dr. Knute Houck, formerly a physician at St. Elizabeth's hospital here, whose wife disappeared several months ago.

Coinciding with Mrs. Houck's disappearance, Dr. Knute Houck, the husband was found wandering aimlessly in Harnett, N. Y. He was unable to account for his sudden disappearance.

Dr. Houck has been living with his parents in Wisconsin.

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"Dr. Houck came west with his mother on a vacation trip, recuperating following a nervous breakdown," said Dr. Crowell. "After his temporary derangement, following the disappearance of his wife, he was under observation by the police at Washington and in a clinic at Johns Hopkins university."

"The family has been convinced all along that his wife ended her own life. The circumstances of the finding of the body, as reported in your dispatches today would seem to bear out this theory."
