Hairdressers and cosmetologists have a social conscience. They have wondered a little whether their profession were really good for the human race. So they submitted a great and vital question to a group of celebrities representative of such varied walks of life as the stage, literature, journalism, legislation, education, feminism, the church and philanthropy. The celebrities gave a single answer, "No." Now if they would just put a similar question with "Good taste" substituted instead of morals and health, would they get the same answer?

What language do you suppose it is? Nothing but plain English, in one of its most familiar specimens, being simply "God Save the King" as spelled phonetically for the school children of Buenos Aires to sing when the Prince of Wales visited Argentina. Giving the letters their Spanish sound, the children were able to pronounce the British national hymn so that it sounded quite all right. Really, you don't know your own language till you see it in a foreign dress. And if it looks queer then to us, how much queerer must it look and sound to the foreigner?

THE WOMEN'S REBELLION

Carrie Chapman Catt, venerable American suffrage leader, prophesies a women's rebellion against arbitrary styles set by the French fashion trust. "This rebellion," she writes in the Forum, "will come with the force and fury of all movements long overdue. It will be ruthless and thorough. It may precipitate the world into bankruptcy, close factories, turn millions into unemployment. No one has ever asked the price of liberty, and we shall not then."

She is particularly rebellious about the prediction of Paul Poiret, that within 30 years women will be in trousers. Not that she objects especially to trousers. In fact, she maintains that they belong to women by right of original invention and use, and have been stolen by men. But she objects to Poiret or any other man telling women what they are going to wear. What then? It is a noble prospect that the rebellious Mrs. Catt opens up:

"Doctors, lawyers, legislators, judges, mothers, housewives, will swell the gathering army. They will plead that abolition of artificial fashion will bring to the average family economy and calm; to the average woman, a costume comfortable, healthful, becoming and adapted to her work; to all women, an emancipation of brains, conscience, arms, legs and feet; to all the people, a dress of beauty and elegance combined with utility and comfort; to business, a stability heretofore unknown, and to the world at large, the removal of a distracting, artificial and menacing factor."

Three rousing cheers! If Mrs. Catt can accomplish this glorious consummation and at the same time give the Parisian style-setters a black eye, more power to her! Even the American clothing industry can probably endure the temporary upset, for the sake of establishing women's garb ultimately on a standardized basis of beauty and utility. When that great revolution comes, manufacturers will have reason to hope that the permanent models they are making will remain in vogue for at least one whole season.

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DR. KNUTE HOUCK WILL BE FREED

No Evidence of Crime Exists So Charges to Be Dropped

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24 (AP)—Dr. Knute Houck, detained by authorities in Albany, Ore., will not be brought here for the inquest to be held over the body of his wife, which was found floating with face upturned in the Potomac river near here.

This announcement was made by United States Attorney Peyton Gordon, whose office has cooperated with city police in the baffling Houck case, and came after Major Edwin B. Hesse, superintendent of police, last night had said a detective would be sent for Dr. Houck as soon as he was placed under arrest.

No Evidence of Crime
Mr. Gordon said that Washington city authorities had no right to bring Dr. Houck here when there was no evidence that a crime had been committed. Mrs. Houck disappeared from her home here Dec. 12, after an alleged quarrel with her husband, who then was a psychiatrist at St. Elizabeths hospital, a government institution. This was the last heard of her until her body was found yesterday.

A preliminary coroner's examination disclosed no marks of violence, and none were found when an autopsy was performed later. Further inquest, however, is to be held as soon as a chemical analysis of various tissues of the body is completed. This probably will not be for several days.

STILL IN JAIL

ALBANY, Ore., Mar. 24 (AP)—Dr. Knute H. Houck, Washington D. C. psychiatrist, who was taken into custody here yesterday on telegraphic orders from authorities of the national capital, pending an investigation of the death of his wife, remained in a cell in the county jail here this morning.

Sheriff Frank Richards said the latest word he had received from Washington was a message at 7 o'clock last night directing him to hold Dr. Houck until further orders.

Dr. Houck slept in a cell in the women's quarters of the jail, and though apparently suffering from nervousness, did not seem to be in serious condition, said the sheriff. Albany relatives remained with Dr. Houck most of the time.

FIRE UNDER CONTROL

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 24 (AP)—Fire in holds and bunkers of the British steamer Belcher, which raced into port at Astoria last night after battling the blaze at sea for several days, was under control this morning. This was reported to marine authorities here today. The fire was expected to be extinguished by noon.

The report said that the vessel was not badly damaged. The vessel will discharge part of the cargo in the forward hold before leaving Astoria.

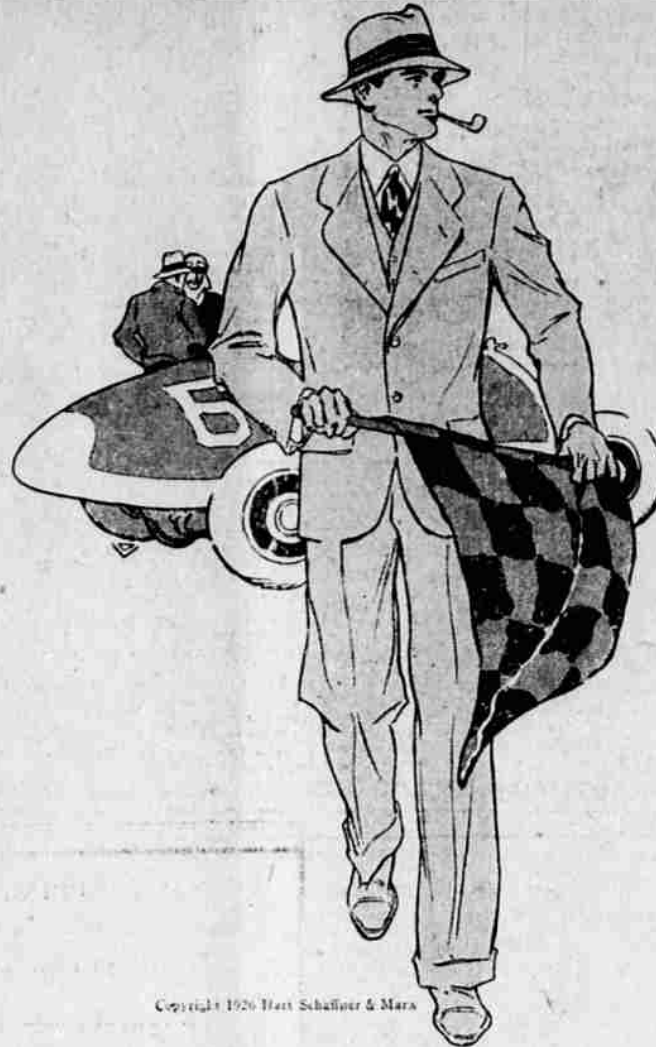
