Jack Holt in Zane Grey Thriller

The struggle of the government homesteader to wrest his lands from the desert of the far west is grippingly portrayed in "The Mysterious Rider," the Paramount picture from the Zane Grey story at the Star theater today for three days.

Jack Holt is the mysterious rider and Betty Jewel, a captivating newcomer to Paramount pictures, is his heroine. They make an appealing and convincing combination, and their "city girl-outdoor man" romance is logical and wholesome.

The story concerns a small colony of ranchers battling the rigors of the desert, the drought, the heat, the sandstorms, then finally treachery, on the part of the lawyer pretending to guard their interests. This role is played by Charles Sellon.
