MENUS

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Sliced bananas with ready-to-serve cereal, cream, spinach with poached eggs, toast, crisp cracker, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Tomato bouillon, toasted crackers, chicken and pineapple salad, whole wheat rolls, Spanish cream, milk tea.

DINNER—Baked haddock with egg sauce, Saratoga potatoes, hot French salad, vegetable salad, peach islands, plain cake, milk, coffee.

The chicken salad is planned to use up the remains from the great chicken served for dinner the evening before.

Peach Islands—One pint canned peaches, 4 table-spoons sugar, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatine, 1 table-spoon cold water, 1 orange, 1 cup whipping cream, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Whip cream until firm, all vanilla and beat into gelatine froth. Pour into a shallow serving dish and dot with halves of peaches. Pour reserved syrup over each peach and put in a cold place to chill.

"The modern young man cannot offer the modern young woman very much more than she can have herself if she is willing to work for it eight hours a day," said Mrs. Lufford, "and then under more ideal conditions than most domestic environments offer. I think the number of marriages will continue to decrease in the next few years."

TEACHER UNDAUNTED BY BUDGET ECONOMY

HEBRON, Conn.—The little red schoolhouse, now fading from the rural landscape of Connecticut, is coming into its own as a new cradle of American citizenship. Although town-budget economy deprives Hebron of the means for extra courses or extra teachers, Mrs. Mary E. Cummings, day teacher, conducts an evening school for the foreign-speaking mothers of her pupils.

Each mother pays 25 cents a lesson. After the equivalent of three weeks of six-hour school days Mrs. Cummings' group learned to read English well enough to make a creditable showing before visitors. They were also able to write simple letters.

DANISH QUEEN MAY QUIT HER ROYAL CHATEAU

CANNES, France—The fairy-tale concept of royalty and palaces

must disappear with so many princesses and princes, queens and kings leaving their ancestral mansions for the more democratic corridors of continental hotels.

Queen Alexandra of Denmark is the latest member of European royalty to contemplate this change. The queen may never again occupy her chateau near here, as her majesty and the king prefer a hotel to the chateau, which is more like a palace.

Many tempting offers have been declined for the property because it was left her by her mother, the Grand Duchess Anastasia of Russia, with the strict understanding that under no circumstances should it ever become a hotel or be used as a public resort.
