

S. P. CONTRACT IS OFFERED TO O. T.

Joint Use of Track Between Paunina, Klamath Falls Provided

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 25 (AP).—Terms of the contract offered the Oregon Trunk road by the Southern Pacific provide that if any disputes arise during the joint use of the track between Paunina and Klamath Falls they will be submitted to arbitration, while other terms are in accordance with suggestions outlined by the interstate commerce commission when it expressed opposition to the building of an independent line to Klamath Falls. There is no mention of construction of branchlines. The terms were published here today.

Full use, under the contract, is offered of the 75.77 miles of its Cascade line at the northern edge of the Klamath Falls yard. Bridge use of 3.65 miles of Southern Pacific main line track through Klamath Falls is offered. On this strip, the Oregon Trunk is forbidden the privilege of taking on or discharging passengers or traffic.

This bridge use is offered as an accommodation to permit Oregon Trunk to reach its terminal properties in the Southern part of the city.

Rental Terms
Rental terms, as formerly proposed ask that the Oregon Trunk pay one-half of five per cent on the cost of the 75.77 miles together with its appurtenances totalling \$5,731,000; similar terms for the Klamath Falls strip totalling about \$435,862; Oregon Trunk is to pay one-half of taxes and one-half of certain overhead charges; the Oregon Trunk is to pay its pro rata covering the maintenance of lines and property coming under the joint user contract, the basis to be that of car-miles.

Agents and dispatchers of the Southern Pacific are to have entire charge of train movements and are to act for the rival line as though they were acting for their own company. If an employee of the Southern Pacific becomes objectionable to the Oregon Trunk, the latter may request his dismissal. The Southern Pacific also made provision for the right to grant the use of its tracks to some other road.

Arbitration Board
In case of dispute, an arbitration board on which each road places one person and the two agree upon a third must act unanimously in order to reach a binding decision. In case of disagreement, two more are to be selected and a majority of the increased number may decide the issue. Under revised conditions arbitrators may be appointed by the courts.

The Oregon Trunk has been given 20 days in which to accept or reject the contract. The Oregon Trunk had previously asked permission to construct its own lines.

FORMER YALE MAN RUNS FOR OXFORD

Norton and another American were selected by the Achilles Athletic club, an association of Oxford and Cambridge men, to represent it in two meets with Greek athletic clubs in Athens, April 10 and 14.

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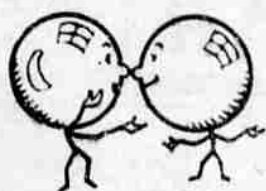
