PRISONER IS BEHIND BARS AT MEDFORD

After eating the jail dinner, he laid down on his couch, answering and asking questions of his fellow prisoners. De Autremont's appearance, in every way, belies the title of "killer" that has been tagged upon him.

To Plead Monday
 In the hurry and bustle of discharging De Autremont left behind his army knapsack. It was found on the depot platform and turned over to the police. It contained army equipment and personal effects.

It is expected that De Autremont under close surveillance will meet his father and his attorney this afternoon. He will be arraigned to plead Monday.

Interviewed on the Southern Pacific train between this city and Ashland by a Mail Tribune representative, De Autremont was seen in a drawing room, and given permission to talk. He was in a light, happy mood.

"I wish I see you are wearing a straw hat," said the reporter, after an introduction and handshake. "Yes," the prisoner replied. "I've heard so much about your climate I thought I would set the style." The interviewer was warned by the postal inspector not to question De Autremont upon the Shogson crime. De Autremont's only reference to the crime was the declaration "I am not guilty."

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 26 (AP)—
 Hugh De Autremont, youthful prisoner arrested four weeks ago in the Philippine Islands in connection with participation in the hold-up of a Southern Pacific train in which four men were killed in October, 1923, boarded a train here last night in custody of Sheriff Jennings, of Jackson county, for Medford.

Sheriff Jennings took De Autremont into his care late yesterday at Alcatraz detention barracks, and formally read to him the charges preferred against him by the Jackson county grand jury. De Autremont smiled as he heard the accusations.

1156 Typhoid Cases In Montreal Today

MONTREAL, Mar. 26 (AP)—
 One hundred and twenty-four new cases of typhoid fever were reported in the 24-hour period ending at noon today, bringing the total number of cases up to 1,156. Free clinics for inoculation against the disease have been opened in all sections of the city.

Strip Clothing From Japanese Women, Children

LONDON, Mar. 26 (AP)—
 Japanese women and children were outraged and assaulted by the Cantonese in Nanking, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express in an account of the release of the foreigners after the last ultimatum by the foreign naval commanders.

Just before expiration of the ultimatum at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon a British party, followed closely by Japanese appeared at the water front. The Japanese numbered about 100.

Nearly every garment had been torn from some of the women and children. The Japanese Major Menito was lavished while attempting to rescue a woman and the Japanese chief of police was shot in the head while trying to save another from molestation. As sole relief, they brought out a large portrait of the late Emperor of Japan and a copy of the Japanese consular code.

pected to be in readiness upon their arrival at the California port.

The American government is reluctant to use the army in China unless it becomes absolutely imperative. Should it be found necessary, however, the troops probably would be taken from the 42nd available in Hawaii and the 15th available at Manila. The Hawaiian force includes the 19th, 21st, 27th, and 28th Infantry regiments and the Philippine force is made up of the 31st Infantry and one battalion of the 15th Infantry.

There are in addition two battalions of the 15th Infantry stationed at Tientsin, China, guarding a section of the railroad to Peking.

Pulling All "Wires"
 Diplomatic as well as military pressure is being brought to bear in the effort to compose the disordered situation in Nanking, Shanghai and other river cities. Consul-general Lockhart at Hankow has been instructed to "protest vigorously" to the Canton authorities against the "unprovoked and outrageous attack upon and the killing of American citizens by nationalist forces at Nanking."

 Before playing to decide which is to take the singles title overseas, Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon of France today won the American indoor doubles championship by defeating Frank Hunter and Dr. George of New York 7-5, 6-3, 6-3 in the finale of the national tennis tournament.

DETROIT, Mar. 26 (AP)—
