2 HOTELS TO
BE ERECTED,
OWNERS SAY

W. C. Becktel and Julius Roesch Guests at Rotary Club Luncheon

BOTH PROMISE TO
BUILD STRUCTURES

Portland Promoter Says His Project Is Virtually Completed, Although Actual Work Remains.

Members of the La Grande Rotary club, during their regular weekly luncheon at the Foley grill today, were assured by both W. C. Becktel, who is to erect a six-story modern hotel at the corner of Adams and Fourth, and Julius Roesch, who is to erect a seven-story hotel at the corner of Adams and Fifth, that both projects will be completed, Mr. Becktel, Mr. Roesch, Ernest Kroner, architect, and R. O. Klinger, of Roseburg, who has leased the Becktel hotel for a period of 10 years, were guests of the club.

Mr. Becktel declared that he will erect in La Grande a six-story structure that will be the finest hotel between Salt Lake City and Portland. He declared that his project might readily be completed although the building remains to be done. He expects it will be completed about August 1.

Pays Tribute to City

Mr. Kroner paid a high tribute to La Grande and the La Grande territory and declared that the hotel would be a source of pride to every citizen of La Grande and would start a new era of growth and development here.

Mr. Klinger stated that he is greatly pleased with La Grande and that he knew of no finer constructed hotel than the "Grande Rondo" will be when finished.

Mr. Roesch said that he would build a seven-story modern hotel and that it would be completed by June 1, 1928.

He said that the raising of the present building at Mr. Adams has been delayed until he can secure the pneumatic tool, now being used by Neuge & McKenney, to break up some of the concrete in his building.

Mr. Roesch said that he had heard much talk about hotels but that since La Grande needed an armory, he expressed a willingness to deposit \$40,000 with a committee of three business men to guarantee that his seven-story hotel would be finished by the first of the year. If not, he said, he would give the \$40,000 to the American Legion to be used in building an armory.

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APARTMENT
HOUSE TO BE
BUILT HERE

Portland Men to Erect a \$75,000 Brick Building This Spring

THIRD, WASHINGTON
SITE IS SELECTED

Structure Will Be Three Stories in Height and Will Have 22 2- and 3-Room Apartments.

A new \$75,000 three-story brick apartment house will be erected at the corner of Third and Washington on the lot owned by Mrs. M. R. Donahue by G. F. Brown and S. E. Henderson, of Portland, Ore., according to Frank L. Lilly, who has been acquainted with Mr. Brown for many years.

The apartment house will contain 22 two- and three-room apartments, modern in every detail, and excavation work is expected to begin early next week.

The Portland men arrived here about 10 o'clock last night and this morning looked over prospective sites, closed a deal with Mrs. Donahue for the lot, paid a part of the sum down, and went on to Boise, Idaho, to attend to business interests there.

To Return Next Week
They expect to return to La Grande next week to supervise the beginning of construction. The apartment house will be a duplicate of one recently built in Portland so that no time will be lost in drawing plans and in other similar preliminary arrangements. It is anticipated that no delays will occur in construction with the plans in readiness.

The Portland men will take possession of the lot at Third and Washington as soon as the abstract is brought up to date. Mrs. Donahue said this afternoon.

ALLOWED IN
LIBEL SUIT

Amendment of Sapiro's Declaration Permitted by Judge Raymond

LETTER TO FORD
IS NOT ADMITTED

Business Manager of Independent, on Stand, Tells of Disposal of "Personal Letters."

DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 28. (AP)—Aron Sapiro, Chicago Jew, known internationally as an organizer of Jewish cooperatives, took the witness stand late today in his \$1,000,000 libel suit against Henry Ford.

DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 28. (AP)—Amendment of Aron Sapiro's declaration in his \$1,000,000 suit against Henry Ford was permitted and a mistrial denied in a ruling this afternoon by Federal Judge Fred M. Raymond.

The judge also held inadmissible as evidence Sapiro's letter to Ford demanding a retraction of approximately 141 libelous statements made in articles printed in the Ford-owned Dearborn Independent.

MISTRIAL HINTED
DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 28. (AP)—Counsel for Henry Ford moved today to prevent Aron Sapiro from amending his declaration of 141 separate libels in his \$1,000,000 libel suit against the automobile manufacturer. Sapiro last Thursday sought to eliminate 54 of the allegations and change the phrasing of one other.

The judge was excused at the opening of court today and legal arguments began.

"If this amended complaint is accepted we must ask for a mistrial and that the case be taken from further consideration of the jury," asserted Stewart Hanley, of Ford counsel.

Hanley's statement
He maintained that in addition to the alleged libels having been laid before the jury in opening statements and testimony Sapiro could not prove them as libels because of incorrect statements of innuendo and insufficiency of allegation.

Hanley quoted at length from precedents, although in making his tentative decision to permit the amendments last Thursday, Judge Raymond cited precedents to show

Ryder House At
Elgin Destroyed
Sunday Evening

ELGIN, Ore., Mar. 28. (Special)—Elgin last night witnessed the burning of one of its old residences, after called the Orel Ryder house. The fire alarm was turned in soon after 9 o'clock but the blaze had gained much headway before the fire department reached the scene, although the run was made in quick time. Nothing could be done except to prevent the flames from spreading.

The house was built by Ed Harris and was owned by J. F. Phyl, of La Grande. There was some insurance on the building. It had been occupied by the Dick Jones family but was unoccupied at the time of the fire. The only pieces of furniture and other things taken out by some of the first men to reach the scene.

Cause of the fire is unknown.

NEW YORK, Mar. 28. (AP)—Artificial silk and other synthetic products may be made from cornstarch pulp, says a report prepared in connection with proposed construction of plants in the middle west corn belt for reclamation of waste cornstarch.

C. B. Roberts Engineering company, specialists in commercial development of industrial processes, announced today that tests show the process discovered by Dr. Bela Dornier, Hungarian chemist, for manufacture of artificial silk and other articles from cornstarch pulp to be commercially and economically practical.

The second shock was more pronounced than the first and lasted about ten seconds, according to information received here.

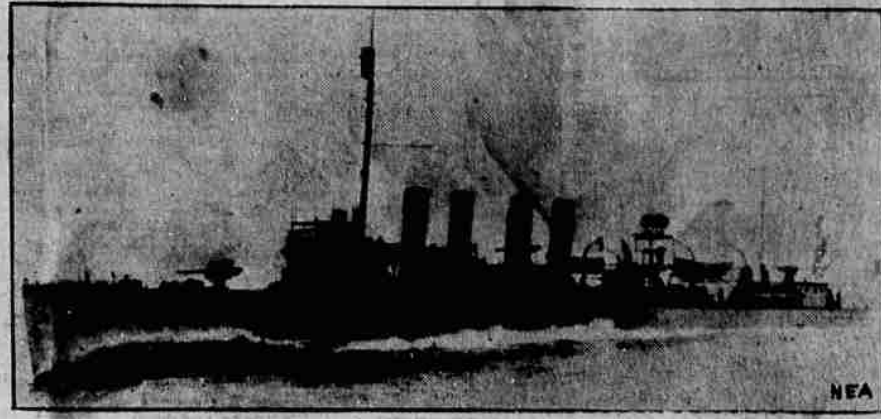
Today the ocean beach was strewn with great piles of kelp, a plant which grows at the bottom of the sea.

U. S. WARSHIP IN BATTLE OF NANKING



This is the U. S. destroyer Preston. With its sister ship, the Naam, and the British cruiser Emerald, the Preston's guns laid down a barrage which kept back invading Cantonese and retreating Shanghai troops, while 100 American refugees and other foreigners evacuated Shanghai (of 100) during the fighting at Nanking, China. Estimates today are that Chinese casualties ranged from 40 to 100 as a result of the barrage. At the right is a picture of the Rev. J. E. Williams, of Shawnee, Ok., vice president of Nanking university, China, who was killed in the attack of the nationalist armies on foreigners at Nanking.

Lewis indicated this morning that he will recommend Gene Halley for the position of deputy warden. Halley is now employed in the public service commission.
