ISSUE PERMITS FOR NEW HOMES

Claud C. Pratt to Erect Two New \$2,300 Residences on O Avenue

Permits for three new dwelling places were issued last week by City Recorder J. E. Sharna, two to be erected across the track and one in Old Town.

The total value of construction work contracted for during the past six days amounts to \$5,650 which brings the March total to a new high record.

Six permits were issued, as follows:

March 21—Edward Mayberry, to build a garage on Washington between Maple and Cherry streets, to cost \$200.

March 22—Claude C. Pratt, to build a dwelling place on O between Willow and Cherry, to cost \$2,300.

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March 22—G. W. Hungerford, to erect a dwelling place on J between Seventh and Eighth streets, to cost \$600.

March 23—United States National bank, to alter and repair a one-story brick building on Depot street between Adams and Washington work to cost \$50.

March 25—E. O. Payton, to alter and repair a two-story house on Adams between First and Cedar streets, work to cost \$100.

SPRINGFIELD—Ground broken for tannery.

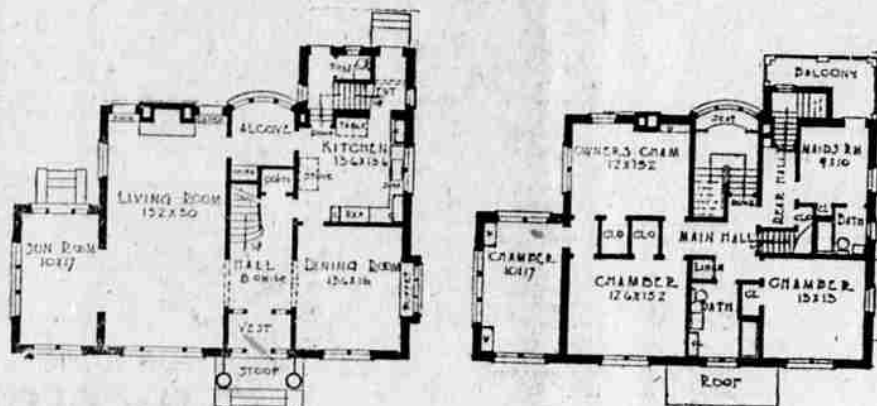
HUBBARD—Cannery will be completed by May 15.

Trees that are set out when small do best in Oregon when staked, says the landscape gardening department of the state college. Any kind of stake that is nearly as tall as the tree and strong enough to hold it erect will do. A piece of old rubber garden hose is good to hold the tree to the stake. A strip of this around the tree and then fastened to the stake prevents any rubbing of the bark or other similar injury.

ATTRACTIVE HOME WITH THATCHED ROOF

This home was planned to meet the social life of one living in a small town, everything incorporated in the plan to make it complete, and of the very best. A plan of the center hall type, with rooms of generous size, well lighted, good wall space, elaborately decorated, exquisite in all its refinements. Note the size of the kitchen, ample cupboards, with sink under the window, work table space, refrigerator, stove, broom closet, incinerator for disposal of garbage, clothes closet, etc. The little breakfast alcove, under the stair, with its circular bay window, and built-in china cabinet is most attractive. A rear stair leads from the rear entry to a servant's room on the second floor, while the grade stairs lead to basement, with a toilet located on the grade landing.

Five chambers are located on the second floor, including the maid's room, which has a private bath. The closets are unusually large, the bedrooms well lighted, with cross ventilation and good wall space.

In the basement is a large laundry, drying room, storage and boiler room, fuel, etc.

The floors throughout are of oak, with walnut trim for the main rooms, first floor, kitchen in birch, white enameled, with rubber tile floor. Both baths have the floor and wainscot.

The ceiling of the living-room is

arched, with rough stippled plastered walls. All the plastered wall on the second floor is tinted.

The exterior walls are of hollow tile, veneered with brick from grade to the second story window belt course, above this, stuccoed with a smooth cream cement. The roof is a thatched shingle of straw shade. The tile walls on the inside have been furred before plastering. The cost of this home, as described, would range from \$20,000 to \$24,000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

Farm Pointers

Hessian flies seldom damage seriously Oregon wheat of the variety well adapted to the locality, seeded at the right time on a good seed bed, the experiment station finds. Wheat thus handled thrives freely so that the tillers destroyed by the pests are rapidly replaced by others, particularly in winter wheat. For spring wheat a quickly maturing variety planted on a well-prepared fertile bed is less damaged than a slower growing variety sowed later.

Apparent extent of many Oregon home grounds is increased by taking advantage of distant views, says A. L. Peck, professor of landscape gardening at the state college. The most pleasing effects are gained by planting to block the uninteresting views and to frame the interesting ones. Enough evergreens are used to make the frames green in winter. Scotch pine being successful.

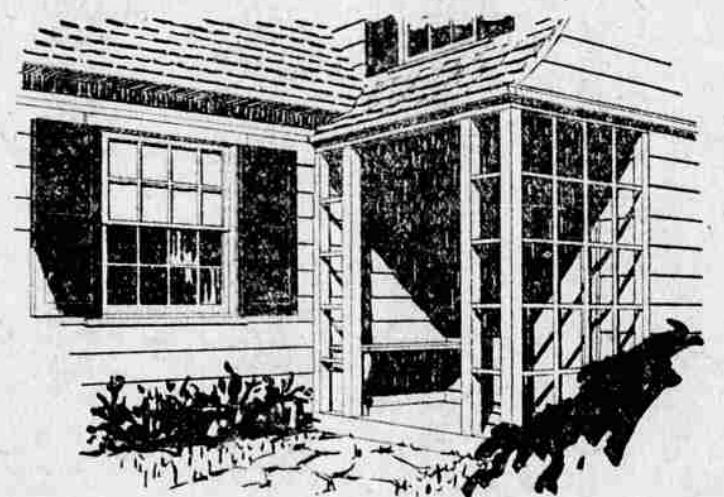
