UNION ROUTE IS SCORED BY MR. STODDARD

The Telocaset road route and 500 persons will soon populate Medical Springs, he declared, answering talk that the Telocaset road would not serve as many families as would the Catherine creek project.

"Should 1,000 persons at Union tell us how to come and put a burden of several thousand on the county?" Mr. Stoddard queried, still speaking as a resident of Medical Springs. He left the question up to the chamber of commerce as a condition for a neutral party. The matter was referred to the road roads committee by President H. E. Coolidge, presiding officer.

Perry To Lose Mill Soon Mr. Stoddard also declared that about the first of the month the last log would be sawed at Perry and the final transfer of mill property to Medical Springs would begin.

Mr. Becktell and Mr. Kroner spoke, the former assuring the chamber that his hotel would be rushed to completion as quickly as possible, and the latter reiterating his prediction that the hotel erection would start a new era of prosperity in this city.

Resolution Passed T. J. Sroczynski, of the better business bureau, announced that H. E. Dixon would give the report on the confidential assessment blanks given the floor to Mr. Dixon he read a telegram of protest to members of the state tax commission and a reply from Treasurer Thomas B. Kay, in which Mr. Kay agreed that many of the questions asked had no bearing on the assessment demands and in which he promised to have these "nuisance" questions removed if possible.

Mr. Dixon declared that schedules C, D, and E, were unnecessary and read a resolution, which was unanimously passed by the chamber, asking that these three schedules be repealed leaving only schedules A and B. Sroczynski has already been eliminated so that actually the resolution hits at only D and E. Mr. Dixon declared that listing of liabilities is "no-body's business" and that the confidential returns opens up entirely too much of the personal methods of operation of business, not pertinent to assessment demands.
