ARGUMENTS MUST END COURT RULE

Judge Raymond Tires of Interminable Debates in Ford-Sapiro Trial

DETROIT, Mar. 29 (AP).—The nearly "interminable" arguments over legal technicalities were done away with in Aaron Sapiro's \$1,000,000 libel suit against Henry Ford when Federal Judge Fred M. Raymond today enunciated a policy of limiting each side.

Sapiro was recalled to the witness stand and Senator James A. Reed, of Missouri, chief of Ford counsel, resumed cross examination.

Reed and Sapiro began like a pair of friendly citizens in a discussion remote from a court of record.

Reed examined Sapiro closely, phrasing his questions a little differently a dozen times in an effort to trap the sharp witness.

The net result was Sapiro's admission that prior to 1925 he was associated with others with whom he shared percentages of the aggregate income of all of them.

He listed these as his special fees from the poultry raisers: 1918, \$11,000; 1919, \$22,519.55; 1920, \$55,055; 1921, \$11,425; 1922, \$65,091; 1923, \$25,091; 1924, \$37,790.

"Your brother is still receiving a retainer fee from the California poultry dealers," Reed asked.

"I think so, yes," Sapiro said that from 1918 to 1923, inclusive, he received a retainer of \$1200 a year from the California Bean growers. In 1924 the retainer was \$1100. He listed these fees: 1918, \$574.93; 1919, \$12,890.55; 1920, \$10,025; 1921, \$4,000; 1922, \$2,850; 1923, \$18,599.92; 1924, \$22,182.

TEETHING SELDOM CAUSES BABY'S ILLNESS

The tendency of the laity and, unfortunately, also of many physicians, who ought to know better, is to attribute all sorts of symptoms and diseases in infancy to teething.

When it is remembered that the teeth begin to be formed at least seven months before a baby is born and that the eruption of the wisdom teeth is seldom completed before early adult life, it seems strange that the only time at which teething, that is, the formation and eruption of the teeth, should cause disturbance in infancy.

No one thinks of attributing hardly or extra fingers at birth, or malnutrition and bronchitis in late childhood or adolescence, to teething. It is just as reasonable, however, to attribute deformities at birth and illnesses in childhood and adolescence to teething, as it is to hold it responsible for so many of the ills of infancy.

Not even drooling is a sign of teething. The connection between drooling and teething is simply that the salivary glands begin to secrete freely at about the same time that the baby begins to get its teeth. A first cause does not know enough to "seal off" their spit and consequently it runs out of their mouths. When they do learn to swallow it, the drooling stops. Nevertheless, they keep on teething! If drooling is excessive or recurs after it has ceased, it is not a sign of teething, but means that the baby has a sore mouth.

Sometimes, but not often, certain symptoms are apparently connected with the eruption of the teeth. In my experience, such symptoms never occur except when the gums are much reddened and swollen over a tooth almost ready to erupt. Under such conditions I have occasionally seen such minor manifestations as restlessness, discomfort, nausea, and slight elevation of temperature.

In very rare instances I have seen more marked symptoms, such as vomiting, diarrhea, and high fever, which I have believed to be due to dentition, because they have ceased immediately when the tooth erupted. Such instances, however, have been extremely exceptional.

Sinclair Continues Fight for Freedom

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP).—After listening to two hours of argument, Justice Hix today took under advisement until tomorrow the motion of Harry E. Sinclair, wealthy oil operator, to set aside the verdict of a jury in the District of Columbia supreme court finding him guilty of contempt of the senate.

Under the law both imprisonment and a fine are mandatory. The full sentence could not be less than one month nor more than 12 months and the fine could not exceed \$1000.

Sinclair, who is at liberty on bail, is determined to fight the case to the United States supreme court if necessary.

Miss Collett Is Tourney Winner

PINEHURST, N. C., Mar. 29 (AP).—Miss Glenna Collett, of Providence, R. I., won the north and south women's golf championship for the fourth time here today by defeating Miss Virginia Van Wie, of Chicago, four and two.

No Change Likely In Timber Policy

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 29 (AP).—There will be no change in the present policy of the United States department of agriculture with respect to sale of federal timber reserves in Oregon, it is stated in a letter received today by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, from W. M. Jardine, national secretary of agriculture. The letter is in reply to senate joint memorial No. 12 passed by the state legislature at its 1927 session.

"After careful consideration of the memorial, I do not feel I could consistently make changes in the existing policies for the sale of national forest stumpage in Oregon," the letter reads.

Sandy Smelt Run Lures Hundreds

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 29 (AP).—The annual smelt run in the Sandy river near here was at its height today, and hundreds of persons, armed with dip nets, screens, bird cages and other contrivances were on the banks of the stream scooping out the little fish.

Buckets, sacks, boxes, and even some auto trucks were filled with the silvery masses taken from the water. County officers were on duty on roads leading to the river regulating traffic as in crowded thoroughfares in the city.

50 per cent of the working force foreign born.

Attracted by the explosion, the families of miners stampeded to the mine mouth. State troopers were sent in from all parts of the region to control the great crowds.

As the diggers attacked the shaft mouth blockade of earth, other men, equipped with gas and smoke helmets, stood ready to enter the blast-torn workings just as soon as the pick and shovel men cleared the way.

Gasous Workings
Number 2, it is said, was known as a gasous workings. Company officials said all approved methods had been adopted in the mine and that it was rock dusted. The miners used safety lamps.

People living ten miles from the mine felt the explosion, which, according to those near the workings, came rippling through the drift mouth and into the open, destroying much property on the surface.

ALTOONA, Pa., Mar. 29 (AP).—The bodies of ten miners were recovered from the explosion wrecked workings of mine No. 2 at Ehrenfeld late this afternoon according to reports received here from the scene.

Moderate Kuomintang (nationalist) elements, the dispatch adds, have been suppressed and even Eugene Chen, the Cantonese foreign minister, appears to be powerless, but it is believed he will be retained in his official capacity on account of his success in dealing with representatives of foreign powers.

SITUATION CRITICAL

LONDON, Mar. 29 (AP).—Messages received in authoritative quarters here today say it is indicated the situation in the upper Yangtze valley may get out of control at any moment, and that it is felt the lives of the foreigners there may be endangered. Trade in that region is at a standstill.

EXPRESSES REGRET

SHANGHAI, Mar. 29 (AP).—General Chang Kai-Shek, Cantonese commander, sent his chief of staff and a secretary aboard the Japanese flagship here this morning to convey his regrets to the admiral for the Nanking affair.

MISSION LOOTED

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP).—The American Catholic mission at Fuchow, is reported looted in a dispatch reaching Shanghai. Admiral C. S. Williams, commander of the American Asiatic squadron, today advised the navy department. The fathers are said to have fled to Kowchow, the admiral's message added.

FEW CHINESE SLAIN

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP).—Doubt that any large number of Chinese were killed when American and British ships opened fire to protect foreigners at Nanking was expressed in a report to the navy department today from Admiral Williams, commanding the American forces in China.

Fuchow is in Kwangtung province in which Canton, seat of the nationalist government, is located. The message gave no details of the reported looting but said that evacuation of Americans from points along the upper Yangtze river was "proceeding satisfactorily."

PRESBYTERIANS SAFE

NEW YORK, Mar. 29 (AP).—A cablegram received today from Canton by board of foreign missions of the Presbyterian church announced that all of the Presbyterian missionaries in south China were safe. There are approximately 45 Americans in the south China Presbyterian missions.

STRIKE CALLED

SHANGHAI, Mar. 29 (AP).—The general labor union in Shanghai has decided to order another general strike, the date to be fixed later. Twenty thousand miscellaneous workers are still idle from the last strike. Thousands of rickshaws coolies are reported to have been forcibly enrolled in the union. General Chang Kai-Shek, the Cantonese commander, asked if he approved the carrying of arms by members of the Shanghai labor unions, replied: "Yes they have the right to arm themselves for protection."
