MENUS

(By Sister Mary)

BREAKFAST—Stewed dried apricots, cereal, cream, creamed eggs on graham toast, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of celery soup, croquettes, stuffed beet salad, whole wheat bread, caramel custard, crisp cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Filet of tenderloin in tomato sauce, boiled potatoes in parsley butter, green beans, cucumber and cream cheese salad, lemon snow, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Stuffed beet salad is most attractive, substantial and economical. Cottage cheese is a valuable food for both young and elderly persons. It is of high vitamin content and easily digested. Although lacking in fat, this deficiency can be easily made up by the addition of cream or olive oil. Beets are rich in mineral content and furnish bulk.

Stuffed Beet Salad
Four medium-sized beets, 1 cup cottage cheese, 2 tablespoons sweet cream, salt, ½ teaspoon paprika, ¼ teaspoon white pepper, head lettuce, mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 4 tablespoons salad oil.

Scrub beets and cook until tender. Dip in cold water and slip skins. When cool enough to handle, cut out centers. Sprinkle lemon juice and oil over beet cups and let stand, covered, in a cold place until thoroughly chilled, at least one hour. Season cottage cheese with salt, paprika and pepper and make moist with cream. Fill beet cups with mixture. Arrange on a bed of crisp lettuce and serve with mayonnaise.

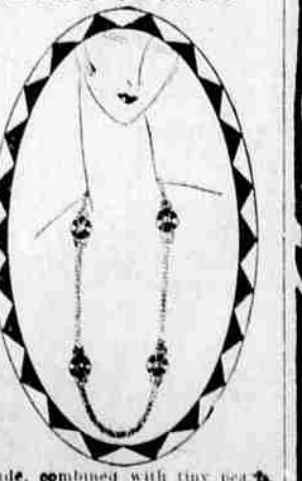
Finely chopped nuts, minced olives and pimientos can be added to the cheese. Orange marmalade combined with the cheese makes a delicious sweetish salad.

Short coats, fashioned of light weight wools, with toile de jour linen facings, have been received with much favor. A smart beige coat, with white linen trimmings, and other blue models, faced with white, also are popular.

Featuring Satin

One shop is featuring satin, a pretty model being made in two tones of rose with a very wide giraffe around the hips, trimmed on the shoulders with shaded chrysanthemums made of chiffon.

Another is a more fitted wrap, which is lined with velvet of a matching shade and trimmed with Russian ermine tuxedo shawl, collar and cuffs.

Hats to match every costume are to be found, with shapes designed especially to suit the individual physiognomy. Imported furs, skins, natural panamas, leg-horns, Milans, ussels and pinapple straws are presented.

lection of bags likewise is noted. A snakeskin bag, with curvilinear stones on the clasp, is well received. One jewelry shop reports the popularity of bags of pastel design, with very fine beads in several shades of red, green, tan and brown.

Bags of raffia fabric trimmings have assumed striped and plaid modes, with new notes also sounded in their colored linen linings. The New York branch shop of forcing them stresses the fact none is duplicated. The new "potted" bag of leather, with metal trimmings, also has become popular, as have the evening bags in the metallic threads of platinum, gold and silver, with copper interspersing the blocks, and lined with moire.

FRENCH DENTISTS NOW MOSTLY WOMEN

PARIS—French women are crowding men in the dental profession. In 1914 only 15 girls dared enter dentistry, but about one-third of the dentists recently graduated from the official French college of dentistry were women.
