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MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, cream, French omelet, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Noodle soup, toasted muffins, jellied spinach and egg salad, canned cherries, plain cake, milk, tea.

DINNER—Canneton of beef with bananas, twice baked potatoes, creamed onion head lettuce with Russian dressing, whole wheat bread, rhubarb pie, milk, coffee.

The meat suggested in the dinner menu is made from nothing more nor less than Hamburg steak, but the canneton is quite tempting enough for a family dinner with guests.

Of course the beef used must be chosen carefully, round steak being preferable. But any cut, if it be fresh, clean meat of good quality, makes a delicious loaf.

It's well to have the butcher run the meat through the food chopper twice for this recipe or any meat loaf.

Canneton of Beef
One and one-half pounds Hamburg steak, 1 lemon, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1 tablespoon grated onion, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 3/4 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 4 to 6 slices bacon, 2 or 3 bananas.

Wash lemon and grate rind. Combine meat, lemon rind, parsley, salt, onion, butter, pepper and paprika. Mix thoroughly.

Form into a roll and put into a well buttered baking pan. Put into a hot oven for twenty minutes. Then cover roll with bacon strips and place bananas cut in halves lengthwise around the meat.

Sprinkle bananas with lemon juice and bake fifteen or twenty minutes longer. Serve the canneton on a hot platter with the bananas around it.
