SAPIRO CLASHES WITH ATTORNEY

Reed and Plaintiff in Arguments During Cross Examination Today

DETROIT, Apr. 1 (AP)—Aaron Sapiro, who is suing Henry Ford for a million dollars damages for alleged defamation of character, was on the witness stand less than 15 minutes today before he clashed again with Senator James A. Reed, chief Ford counsel.

Turning angrily to Judge Fred M. Raymond, he said: "Your honor, this witness is continually wrangling over fine points and finding fault with my questions rather than attempting to answer them!"

Reed asked Sapiro as to speeches made in Texas in 1920 in behalf of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association.

"You were all there in 1921," asked Reed.

Sapiro picked him up instantly. "You mean I was there again?" he asked. "Your question indicates I was there the whole time."

"All right, all right, sir, have it your own way," the senator replied and turned to the judge to protest.

Sapiro was upheld by the court in this instance as justified in not answering Reed's first question.

Probes Texas Dealings
The Ford attorney started his third day of cross examination by going into the organization of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association. Sapiro testified there were bankers and heads of other agricultural associations on the pre-organization committee, but no warehouse men that he could remember.

"You started in to get a million holes of cotton contracted for," said Reed.

"That was our goal," Sapiro said. "Many seats were vacant again this morning and the press tables which have been crowded with out-of-town correspondents were almost deserted."

Sapiro said he had received no money for speeches explaining cotton contracts. "That was considered part of his work. He admitted he realized advantages he hoped would be realized by the association and attempted to persuade farmers to join."

Reed for work performed in the Texas from 1921 until 1926 totaled approximately \$37,250, Sapiro testified.

MEDEFORD, Ore., Apr. 1 (AP)—By a deal completed yesterday, the Jackson County bank of this city, and the Fidelity bank of Gold Hill, were consolidated and the Fidelity bank ceased operations. The consolidation was officially approved by the state banking board, and officers of the two institutions, last night with the formal transfer effective today.

It was announced that Walter Zimmerman, president of the Fidelity bank would open a bank in Cliftonville, Klamath county, at an early date.
