### Sapiro Witness As Court Quits Over Week End

DETROIT, Mich., Apr. 2 (AP)—The defense of the \$1,000,000 libel suit of Aaron Sapiro against Henry Ford and his publication, the Dearborn Independent, gave jurors hearing the case a list of fees received by the plaintiff for work in connection with farm, marketing, organizations to ponder over the week end.

United States Senator James A. Reed, counsel for Ford, whose paper charged Sapiro was prompted by motives other than altruistic in carrying on the work has announced that he will show Sapiro and his law partners received in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000 for this work. Previous to yesterday's session he drew from Sapiro testimony that the latter received around \$250,000 in fees and before court adjourned for the week end the list was materially increased. And as Sapiro on the witness stand recited the list of fees received, he was frequently interrupted by the query from Senator Reed:

"Didn't you tell them that you were not interested in fees? That the welfare of the farmers was the big thing?"  
To which the witness shot:  
"I may have and if I did it was a fact."  
Sapiro will resume the stand again Monday for further recital of his operations.

sleep, but a great many go on working harder than ever. In this machine age there is an increased nervous expenditure and a decreased muscular output. The modern business man rides in his auto instead of walking. Machinery takes the place of muscle, not only with the business man, but with the industrial man and the farmer.

Cancer is also most common at this period but is not caused by the diet. These act as a mechanical stimulus to the bowels. Persons with defective teeth or delicate digestion require a different type of diet, such as soups, purees, green peas, boiled carrots, milk toast, milk, buttermilk, etc. The family physician is the proper one to consult about the diet.
