Silver Dollar Giving Way to Paper Money West of the Missouri River

OMAHA, Apr. 1 (AP)—The silver dollar, symbol of the west's faith in "hard money," is giving way to paper currency on the sun-set side of the Missouri river after half a century of supremacy.

The federal reserve system, with its facilities for interchange of money, is credited with erasing gradually an arbitrary line from the Twin Cities through Omaha and Kansas City west of which the silver dollar long was king of the monetary realm, and east of which

it was seldom seen.

Otto Alverson, pioneer Omaha banker whose business takes him throughout the west, confirms the impression of financial men generally that paper currency is gaining favor where once the cry was for "iron money."

In saloon days—and every frontier town had its Silver Dollar Bar—a generation ago—men wanted coins they could clank down on the counter to attract the bartender's attention.

Served as Chips

When they gambled, the heavy coins served for chips and were more easily identified than paper dollars.

Western laborers received a comparatively small wage, and they were not "hillbilly boys," they wanted money they could think and feel.

Mining Favored

Demand of the big silver states for change of a silver dollar was a factor in its popularity in early days, when silver mining was young. The dollar was circulated in the region which obtained its coinage, and because it was made at the Denver and San Francisco mints, it was easier to get in the west than paper currency, which had to be shipped from Washington.

Today the circumstances of its passing is viewed with no alarm by silver men. Their bullion finds ready use now in half dollars, quarters and dimes.

NO WORD ON U. S. PLANS IN THE ORIENT

at the state department. It was said that Secretary Kellogg was consulting with Admiral Williams, probably through the navy department, in regard to the Nanking incident, but the department refused to give any inkling as to the conversation and also declined to say whether a British communication outlining steps the London government is preparing to take and asking American cooperation had been received officially.

Uneasiness over the situation at Tientsin and even at Peking where there is an American legation guard of approximately 400 marines is believed to reflect official knowledge there and in Shanghai that the agitators have already gained a foothold in these northern cities despite military control of Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian war lord, whose battle slogan in recent months has been elimination of Russian influence.

Shanghai Quiet
Conditions prevailing today in the Shanghai international settlement and the French concession were reported to be quiet by Admiral Williams.

Barbed wire and sand bag defenses in the settlements and the concessions are being strengthened, he said, adding that the arrival of one battalion of English troops (the Green Howards) due today, would bring the British defense strength to more than 12,000 men.

Agitation continues in the native section of the city, it was reported.

OREGONIANS IN CHINA

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 2 (AP)—Among the Americans who have been stationed in Canton, China, which Americans were ordered to leave today, are Mrs. Alberta Van Elton, of Corvallis; Miss Dorothea Abraham, of Roseburg; Miss Elsie Howell, of Roseburg; and Leland T. Chapin, of Portland.

TOKYO, Apr. 2 (AP)—The Japanese cruisers Abukuma and Kuma today were ordered to proceed to Shanghai from Tientsin. They are expected to arrive Sunday.

SHANGHAI, Apr. 2 (AP)—With Shanghai and Nanking safely in the hands of the Cantonese forces, the national flag was being carried steadily northward today toward the Yellow river.

The vanguard of the southerners had reached Peking, 25 miles from their main concentration camp at Peking, up the Tientsin-Peking line, while nationalist guerrillas were believed to have penetrated beyond Peking.

BLOCKADE LIKELY

LONDON, Apr. 2 (AP)—Reuters' Peking correspondent says it is believed there that a blockade of the Southern Chinese coast and the mouth of the Yangtze river will probably be started if the demands of the powers regarding the Nanking incident are not complied with when presented to the nationalities.

LONDON, Apr. 2 (AP)—The British government it was officially announced today, has decided to send reinforcements to Shanghai, consisting of a brigade of infantry and auxiliary units.
