La Grande Club Wins 2 Matches In Trap Contest

The La Grande trapshooting team of the Wing, Pin and Fleet club, shooting here and in Baker at an invitation tournament, won two first places in yesterday's round of The Oregonian's telegraphic event.

The local team scored a 73, which was four better than Baker's 69 and two better than Portland's 71. This boosted La Grande's average to around 690 and firmly entrenched the team in the first division.

The three high guns in the local club were: Jesse Brodhers, 25; W. H. Holmstrom, 22; and Tracy Holmstrom, 22. R. Cox, Dr. Hart and M. Basch, of Baker, all turned in a 23.

Several teams were represented at Baker yesterday.

Over the state Salem gunners went into a tie with Bend for first place in the tournament. The capital city club captured two regular matches and won one shoot off.

Chicago Suburb Quintet Winner Of Tournament

CHICAGO, Apr. 4 (AP)—More than high school, of Chicago, Illinois won the high school basketball championship of the nation last night from Batesville, Arkansas by a two point margin—18 to 16.

The bronze team of the Chicago suburbs, composed of Indiana named Kwasaki, Rondinella, Nystron, Rozabek and Fencil ground down the Arkansas quintet in the final game of the tournament and won from a team whose vigorous gameness was not enough to offset the burly pace the visitors set.

Five weary boys from Florence, Mississippi beat five weary boys from Huron, South Dakota 19 to 16 Saturday night and won third place in the national high school tournament title ranking. Huron, the defeated team, is rated fourth among the 42 competitors at the event.

NEW YORK, Apr. 4 (AP)—Winifred Westover Hart, who divorced Bill Hart, screen actor, would take him again for the sake of their four-year-old son, the New York American today quotes her as saying: "If Bill walked in here tomorrow and said, 'come back to me,' I'd do it for the sake of our son," she said. "Husband and wife can never be anything but husband and wife."

The interview marked the expiration of an imposed silence of five years, says The American, during which time she would have had a \$100,000 settlement had she given interviews or posed for pictures. She obtained a divorce in Reno with custody of the boy.

Score Divorces

"I do not believe in divorce—there is no happiness to be found in the courts," said Mrs. Hart. "If a couple have no children, yes, there is perhaps a remedy in divorce, but when there is a child the public always remembers."

Mrs. Hart explained that in her case it was either the divorce or lose the \$100,000, which she said Bill Jr., might need some day. She plans to re-enter motion pictures. "Bill Jr.," as she calls him, is never going into the movies, she insists, but wants to become a lawyer.

Mexican Bandits Arrested; Admits Killing American

MEXICO CITY, Apr. 4 (AP)—Members of a band which kidnapped and murdered Edgar M. Wilkins, an American electrical engineer, were in the custody of the Mexican authorities at Guadalajara today.

They were captured by the local police near here after having been sought since a week ago last Sunday by federal troops. Three of the men captured were said to have confessed that Wilkins was killed because the members of the bandits were enraged over the close pursuit.

The ten-year-old son of Wilkins, who was captured with his father, identified Mariano Calzada, one of the men taken into custody today, as the leader of the kidnapers. The youth had been released by the Mexicans shortly after capture and sent back into Guadalajara with a note demanding a ransom of \$20,000 for the father, Isidoro.

Peres and Vicente Perolsado were the other men arrested.

From information given the authorities by Calzada they were hopeful of capturing other members of the band.
