### PLAN CAMPAIGN AGAINST RABIES

Government, State and County Authorities to Work in Grant

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 5 (AP)—Government, state and county authorities were cooperating today to rid Grant county, in Eastern Oregon, of the menace of rabies which have made peaceful farm animals try to emulate deeds of beasts celebrated in nursery rhymes.

The famous cow that jumped over the moon had a counterpart in a cow that tried to leap into the wagon of a farmer. Its career, however, was cut short by the farmer who rushed to the house and got his rifle.

A horse, stricken by the disease, turned upon the rider, trying to bite him, and then dashed through three wire fences before it was roped and put to death.

Including a ferocious yard dog, fought with a dog, forcing the farmer to take refuge in the corners of a barn. Another dog joining the battle finally overpowered and killed the coyote. Both dogs later had to be killed.

These instances, reported by I. B. Haselbine, deputy game warden at Canyon City, and Dick Richards, county agent of Grant county, caused Stanley Jewett, director of the predatory animal department of the federal biological survey to dispatch Elmer Williams, expert varmint exterminator, to the Bear Valley and Lake sections of Grant county to direct three other government hunters already on the ground, in an effort to wipe out the menace.

Coyotes will be trapped and poisoned, and dogs will be placed in quarantine until the danger is passed, said Jewett. The state livestock sanitary board, and the county authorities of Grant county have promised to cooperate.

Owing to the fact that the rabies virus often remains dormant for months before an outbreak occurs it would be necessary to exercise vigilance a long time, said Jewett. There are comparatively few coyotes in the section affected, and they will be pursued with all the skill of the government hunters.

First information of rabies in Grant county was received by biological survey officials in Portland when the head of a dog was received for analysis. Later a coyote's head came in. Both were found to be infected.

### Southern Oregon Marathon a Hoax

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Apr. 5 (AP)—A report from Medford late yesterday that two marathon runners of the Medford Craters had started for Grants Pass, aroused interest here, provided to have been part of a merry invasion of Grants Pass by the Craters.

The runners, each portly 200 pounds, started from the heart of Medford in athletic garb, but they boarded a train and traveled the rest of the way on the rails. The Craters came in force and were entertained by the cave men at a dinner here last night.

### FORFEITS AND FINES AMOUNT TO ABOUT \$250

The city treasury is richer by more than \$250 today as the result of police activities over the week end.

W. M. Mayhood, who pleaded guilty to drunkenness, was last night sentenced in municipal court to pay a fine of \$25 and serve 10 days in jail. Mayhood is an old offender, police declare.

A. C. Carpenter did not appear for trial and forfeited \$25. The charge against him was drunkenness.

Mary Keating, also charged with drunkenness, failed to appear for trial and forfeited \$25.

H. Zweifel, who pleaded guilty to possession of home brew, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$200.

Trial of T. Knight, charged with disorderly conduct, was postponed until tonight at 7:30 o'clock.

### Dewey Russell Is Guilty of Assault

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 5 (AP)—Dewey Russell, alleged partner of Albert Brownie in the holdup of the Veneta pool hall, was found guilty of assault with intent to rob by a jury in circuit court here late yesterday. No date has been set for the sentence.

The jury was out for a little more than two hours.

Russell was charged with participation in the Veneta robbery of February 27, when William Mad-daugh, proprietor of the pool hall, was shot and seriously wounded.

### Construction of Rail Line Delayed

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 5 (AP)—Construction of a new line from Klamath Falls through Cornell, Cal., to connect with the Nevada-California-Oregon, near Alturas, Cal., will be delayed by the Southern Pacific company until after disposition has been made of the case pending before the U. S. C. on the proposal of the Oregon Trunk to extend from Bend to Klamath Falls. This is stated in the annual report to the stock holders by Henry W. DeForest, chairman of the executive committee.

### Marines Entrain At Quantico On Way to Orient

WASHINGTON, Apr. 5 (AP)—Four trains carrying a detachment of 568 marines were scheduled to leave Quantico, Va., for San Diego today where a second force of 1500 is to be mobilized in the event they are needed in China. The equipment of the "devil dogs" includes two batteries of field artillery, three tanks and a company of engineers.

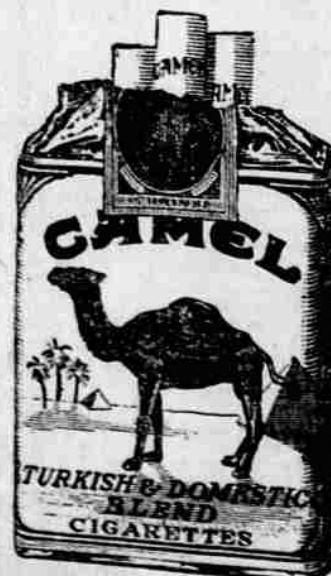
