NORTH BEND, Ore., Apr. 6 (AP)—A vision of an airplane caught in a forest at Cleone, Cal., near Fort Bragg, with one of the pilots unconscious and the other slightly hurt, was offered today as a clue in the search for two Pacific Air Transport flyers missing in California since Sunday morning.

Miss Ruby Brigham, telephone operator for the Coos and Curry Telephone company here, reported that she had the vision and that the name Cleone came to her simultaneously.

She told Mrs. Verne C. Gorst, wife of the president of the Pacific Air Transport company, whose home is in North Bend, and Mrs. Ober, urged her to send the information to the officers of the company at San Francisco, in the hope that it might be of some aid in the search.

Miss Brigham said she frequently has had visions and premonitions that have developed into certainty.

land, the mighty transport that was to bear thousands and thousands to France under her new name, the Leviathan.

Signed at 1:11 o'clock

The scene shifted to the white house.

"The war resolution was signed by the president at 1:11 o'clock," said another message sent humming over the wires.

"The president signed with a pen handed him by Mrs. Wilson, and which he will preserve.

"The president also signed a proclamation formally declaring a state of war between the United States and Germany."

That let loose the mobilization orders for the army, navy, marine corps, coast guard, national guards and all reserves. Already the recruiting officers were swarming with eager volunteers.

The Decade Since

The ten years since that day—years of battle, of victory, of restlessness and fermenting post-war differences—have brought to the grave all three of the men whose names are written on the war resolution—Wilson, Marshall and Clark, only a bare handful remain of the struggle with the fretful aftermath of war.

By C. B. Jones (Associated Press Feature Writer) WASHINGTON, Apr. 6 (AP)—A decade has passed since the United States added its strength to the world war forces allied against the ambitions and hopes of Germany.

In the 12 months that followed before the armistice was achieved many men who had spent most of their lives preparing for leadership in such an emergency were tested, found ready and allowed to make their bid for immortality.

Today, however, only two of those who had a dominant part in shaping the course of America's military effort remain on the active rolls of the army. None is on the navy roster. The years had piled up while the leaders were preparing for their test, and when victory came the age of retirement had passed for many and was approaching for others.

John Biddle, who commanded the United States railway regiments in France, was assistant chief of staff and later commanded the American forces in England.

Lieutenant General Hunter Liggett, who commanded the First Corps at St. Mihiel and subsequently the First Army and was the first commander of the American forces in Germany after the armistice, is living in San Francisco.

Major General Henry T. Allen, who relieved him in Germany, is spending his retirement in Washington, as are Major General David C. Shanks, commander of

the Port of Embarkation at Hoboken, and Joseph T. Dickman, commander of the First Corps at General Liggett's promotion.

Lieutenant General Robert Lee Bullard, former commander of the Second Army, is devoting much of his time to the efforts of the National Security League, of which he is president.

Major General Hugh L. Scott, who was chief of staff when war was declared, but soon afterwards retired for age, only to be recalled immediately for active duty, is chairman of the New Jersey State Highway Commission. Major General Leonard Wood, who or-

ganized and trained thousands of national army recruits in this country, has been governor general of the Philippines since 1921.

Major General Enoch H. Crowder, provost marshal general in charge of the draft, continued in public life as ambassador to Cuba.

Twins to Industry

Industrial development had greater appeal for Major General James G. Harbord, Pershing's chief of staff and reorganizer of the Service of Supply, who resigned in 1922, while deputy chief of staff, to become president of the Radio Corporation of America.

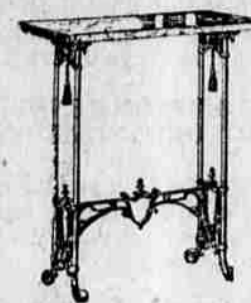

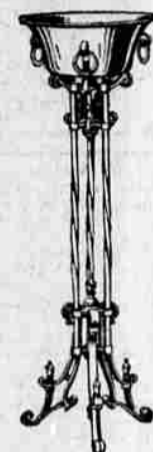

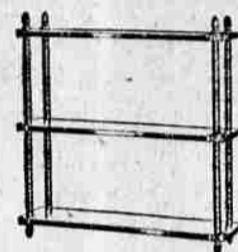
