## FARMER CHASED BY MAD CATTLE

### Rabies Reported Near Chiloquin—Coyotes Are Spreading Disease

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Apr. 6. (AP)—A tale of maddened dairy cows and beef cattle attacking employees of his ranch, of the death of 14 cattle from rabies, of mad coyotes, with foam drooling from their fangs, attacking his herd, was told here today by H. M. Anderson, owner of a 1000-acre ranch three miles north of Chiloquin on the Williamson river.

Only the agility of one of his employees, Dick Shutte, prevented a fatality, Anderson said. Shutte was milking a cow, suddenly another cow nearby began bawling. Shutte looked up in surprise and to his amazement saw the beast charging toward him with lowered head.

### Beats Cow to Fence

He took to his heels. The race terminated at the other end of the field, when Shutte jumped head first over a fence just in time to avoid the stricken beast.

Anderson places his loss at \$1500. He was forced to kill 11 calves in addition to the 14 beef and dairy cattle.

"Symptoms are the same," he said, "the best gets stiff necked, then begins to bawl. Two or three days later it dies."

Cows have been attacking each other in their madness, Anderson reported. He is fearful lest the infection spread throughout his entire herd of more than 100.

## Indians Escape From City Jail

PENDLETON, Apr. 6 (AP)—Mrs. Joe Hayes and Mrs. Lizzie Smith, Indian women held in the city on charges of intoxication, escaped last night by removing bars over the transom of the cell door. It is thought that they had outside assistance. Dan Collins, who is alleged to have given the women the liquor, is facing an open charge of possession, but should the women be apprehended, he will face the federal charge of selling intoxicants to Indians.
