RETAIL PRICES STILL DROPPING

Asparagus, Celery and Oranges Down on Local Markets Today

The downward trend in retail prices in La Grande on spring offerings in the vegetable line continues. Asparagus, formerly quoted at 28 cents a pound, is now selling at 25 cents a pound and lettuce in offered two heads for 25 cents. Celery is down to 20 cents from 25 cents and oranges are now quoted at 50 cents to 70 cents a dozen. Former quotations were 55 to 75 cents a dozen.

Industrials And Rails Go Higher In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Apr. 6 (AP).—Bullish enthusiasm ran rampant again in today's stock market, with the chief demand centering in the rails and high grade industrials. The S. & W. 300 composite touched another new high record for all time at 172 1/2 and General Motors at 154. "Katy" common, a Kansas City Southern, Western Maryland and preferred and a few other rails established new high price records since 1925 or longer. Oil continued to rally on short coverings and market held fairly well. A good investment demand also was apparent for such issues as General Railway Signal, Western Union and Woolworth, all of which touched new peak prices for the year, or longer, the gains ranging as high as 5 1/2 points. Fox Film "A" and American Agricultural Chemical preferred were hammered down to new low 1927 prices. Delivery in oil, over-extended short interests created rapid advances in many industrials in the first hour. Bethlehem Steel advanced to 55 1/2 in anticipation of early dividend action and brisk advances were made by Youngstown Sheet and Tube, Crumley, Inglehart, Gulf States and Shinn. Sheffield steel, Baldwin, Continental Baking "A" and Gimbal Brothers advanced 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 points. Total sales approximated 2,200,000 shares.

Butter Market Steady, Strong; Eggs Unchanged

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 6 (AP).—The local butter market is steady to strong today with storage holdings depleted and newly offered cubes steadily absorbed. The two top cube grades, extras and standards, are each half cent higher as a result of trading on the local dairy exchange yesterday afternoon.

The price of eggs remained unchanged for today in the face of a brisk demand to offset heavy receipts. Storage holdings continue on the increase with 1132 cases added yesterday.

No change in local price trends for wholesale meats and poultry was evident in today's early trading. Hogs alone show an uneasy downward tone with 16 to 16 1/2 cents for tops.

Potential receipts of local rhubarb offered on the wholesale market at 30 cents per pound indicated that it is now definitely on the market in reliable amounts. It is still being supplemented with some California stock.

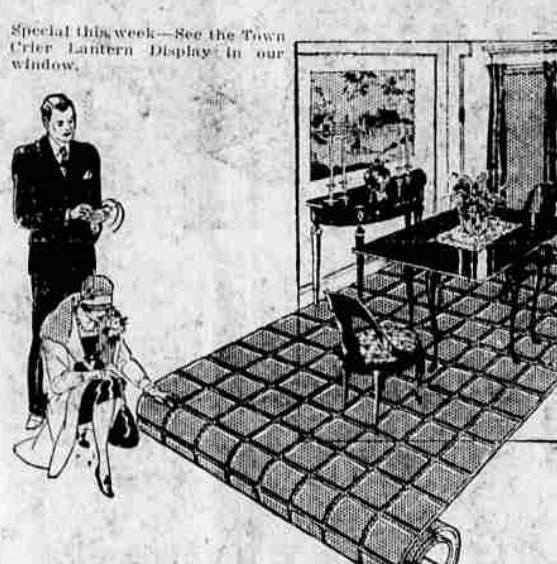

TOKYO, Apr. 6 (AP).—With liabilities of approximately 500 million yen (about \$250,000,000) the temporary suspension of the firm, which controls from 10 to 70 large subsidiaries, affected a temporary suspension today. It announced also there would be no payment of bills for the present, yen to drop on the exchange.

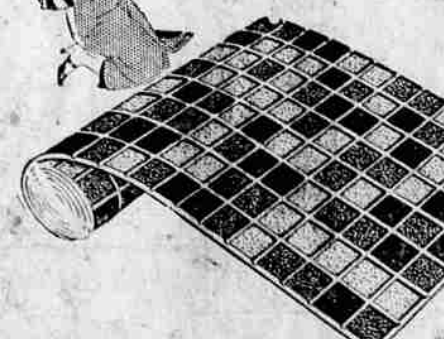
