RAMKINS OF CHICKEN AND RICE
One 3 1/2 or 4 pound chicken, 8 cups water, 1 1/2 cups rice, 4 table-spoons tomato catsup, 2 table-spoons minced green pepper, 1 table-spoon chili sauce, salt.
Clean and disjoint chicken. Cook in water until tender. Lift out chicken. Add enough boiling water to stock to make 2 quarts, reserve 1 quart for dinner soup and cook rice in remaining stock. Cook the rice very slowly until soft and stock absorbed. Add chicken coarsely chopped, catsup, minced pepper, chili sauce and salt. Simmer 10 or 15 minutes and turn into buttered ramkins to serve. Garnish with a spring of parsley.

Senate Campaign Funds Committee To Continue Work

WASHINGTON, Apr. 8 (AP)—Decision by Vice President Dawes that the senate campaign funds investigation committee has authority to function during the recess of congress today provoked considerable comment and speculation in the capital.

The position of the vice president, although in line with the views of a number of the senate's distinguished constitutional lawyers, runs counter to that of his party leaders, and Chairman Keyes of the audit and control committee, who has refused to approve vouchers for expenditures by the Reed committee, said he would consider General Dawes' statement most carefully before making up his mind as to whether he would change his attitude.

Returns From Panama
Mr. Dawes made his announcement in Chicago upon his return yesterday from a vacation trip to Panama. He said he was guided by the supreme court decision in the Mat Loughery case that the senate and its committee are a continuing body, and announced the appointment of Senator Keyes, republican, Ohio, to succeed Senator Goff, republican, West Virginia, who recently resigned from the committee.

The question of the right of the Reed committee to continue work during the congressional recess arose when the filibuster in the closing days of the last congress
