PALM SUNDAY
BEGINS WEEK
OF WORSHIPUnion Service to Be Held

Churches of La Grande yesterday entered into the annual observance of Holy week, which will culminate with Easter Sunday services. Yesterday was Palm Sunday and several congregations had special programs.

The Episcopal church morning service featured the custom of distribution of palms, which took place at the close of the worship hour.

"The Palm" by Faure, was sung at the First Presbyterian and First Methodist Episcopal churches by G. L. Dutton and Sherwood Williams, respectively.

Confirmation services were held yesterday during the morning service at the Lutheran church. The Rev. L. H. Aves, pastor, spoke on "The Homeage That Jesus Seeks."

In the evening the Sacrament campfire girls presented the play "Janie."

Baptismal services were also a part of the day's program.

Attendance at all churches is reported to have been excellent.

The La Grande Ministerial association is sponsoring the observance of Holy week and this evening the first union service will be held at the First M. E. church, with the Rev. L. H. Aves, pastor of the local Lutheran church, presiding.

Friday, 8 p. m., at South Methodist church, the Rev. H. W. Parker, presiding.

Good Friday services will be held from noon until 2 p. m., at the Episcopal church with seven preachers participating as follows: R. C. Ayres, the Rev. C. V. Dunn, the Rev. J. A. Hall, the Rev. G. A. Pollock, the Rev. H. K. Wallis, the Rev. L. H. Aves, and the Rev. Oliver Riley.

During this service those who cannot remain for the whole time are asked to enter or leave during the singing of the hymns so as not to disturb the devotion.

No formal collections will be taken at any of the union meetings, but an offering basin will be found at the door of the church for the use of any who care to make an offering.

PLANES MAY
BE HIRED TO
SCOUT WOODSChief Forester in Port-
land to Discuss Fire
Prevention for 192796,000,000 ACRES
TO BE PROTECTEDHigh Hazard Carried on
Most of Western Tim-
ber—Army Air Service
Unable to Aid

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—Colonel W. B. Greeley, chief forester here today to discuss fire prevention with government forest officials of western states, said that while it was doubtful whether army airplanes would be available for forest fire patrol duty this summer, he was considering the possibility of hiring commercial planes for the purpose.

Colonel Greeley said that his service would not be hopelessly crippled by loss of airplane scouts if they could not be obtained. He said, however, that the aviators do very useful work in spotting fires just started after electrical storms, and in observation when the air is so thick with smoke that ground lookouts have limited vision.

In conference with his aides, Colonel Greeley today began work of preparing to protect 96,000,000 acres of timber in western states that carry high fire hazard. He expects to remain in this territory two weeks and then go to California.

Among those present at the conference today were Carl Neal, supervisor of Umpqua forest, Roseburg; and John Irwin, supervisor of Umatilla forest, Pendleton.

BLIZZARD FATAL
TO 6 CANADIANSWorst Storm in Years
Sweeps Prairie Pro-
vinces Today

WINNIPEG, Apr. 11 (AP)—Torrential rains, heavy winds and the worst spring blizzard in many years today had isolated several districts in the prairie provinces after taking a toll of 85 lives. A railway accident and traffic mix-ups blamed on the storm caused the fatalities. Telegraph wires and other means of communication have been disrupted by the gales and roads made impassable by the four to five-foot snowdrifts and flooded streams.

LIVESTOCK BURNED
PORT COQUITLAN, B. C. Apr. 11 (AP)—Forty horses, 25 head of cattle and sixty hogs perished in a fire that destroyed all outbuildings on a 700-acre farm five miles from here in the Pitt River valley.

ASKS INVESTIGATION
SALISBURY, Apr. 11 (AP)—A request was received today by Rhon Luper, state engineer, asking that the state begin an investigation of the Deschutes county municipal improvement district with a view to have new bonds issued under a new law to show an indebtedness of \$455,248.93 which is faced by the district. Under the new law, which was enacted by the 1927 Oregon state legislature, bonds of a different character can be sold by irrigation districts in this state.

Police Lecture
Married Couple
EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—A married couple of Roseburg, whose names were not given, were lectured by police Saturday night because they had left their four month old baby locked in their coupe at a street corner. The police, who had been attracted by the child's crying, reminded the parents that there is a state law against leaving children in such manner.

HILLBORO, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—Mrs. Eva McGee, widow of Dr. W. G. McGee, went as she entered the Washington county court room this morning for the opening of her second trial on a charge of slaying her husband with poison. Her first trial in Tillamook last November resulted in a disagreement of 11 jury. She has been out on bail since the first trial.

White Metal Ores
Are Rich in Tin
GRANTS PASS, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—"Mystery" white metal ores sent for assay, have been determined as tin bearing by the Minnesota school of mines, the first official assay which has secured tin direct from the ore. Samples of rock sent there returned \$55.70 per ton, \$6.60 in gold and traces of other metals, according to a certificate received by the Golden Cross Mine near Gold Hill. In the first attempt, the school of mines found no traces of tin in the samples.

Airplanes To Be Tagged Similar
To Automobiles, Ruling Provides
WASHINGTON, Apr. 11 (AP)—Air pilots will be divided into four classifications, ranging from the grade of private chauffeur to the highest distinction of "transport pilot," a term applied to the driver of a big machine for long distance carriage of goods and people. Besides there is a commercial pilot grade and a limited flight permit going to a pilot competent to take up passengers for short trips around an air field.

Dr. Dobbs Goes
On Trial Today
In Murder Case
SEATTLE, Apr. 11 (AP)—An immediate battle for suppression of state evidence was indicated when the trial of Dr. C. C. Dobbs, Kirkland dentist, charged with the murder of Leticia Whitcomb, a school girl patient, opened in superior court here today.

The motion to declare important state evidence illegal was filed soon after Dr. Dobbs was first arrested, but it has not been argued. The defense contends the evidence was seized during a raid on the dentist's home and dental offices by officers who failed to obtain a search warrant.

George H. Crandall, defense attorney, said he would file names of additional witnesses in controversy, the state's assertion that the dentist killed the girl and hid her body in a swamp near Kirkland October 30. Thirty-two defense witnesses and 53 prosecution witnesses already have been summoned.

Rescue Workers
Recover Bodies
Of Two in MineOlympia Man Dies of In-
juries Received in Auto
Accident—Milton Resi-
dent Hangs Self.

SEATTLE, Apr. 11 (AP)—Rescue workers today recovered the bodies of Dan Dick, 32, and Frank Espamer, 45, from the debris of a cave in which they and five other miners were trapped Friday in the Carbonado workings of the Pacific Coast Coal company. It was expected another of the trapped men would be reached today. No hopes are held that any of the remaining men are alive. The bodies of Timothy H. West and George Tenby were recovered Saturday.

LONGVIEW, Wash., Apr. 11 (AP)—W. Cunningham, 28, Olympia, died early today at Kelso general hospital from injuries received last night when his motorcycle was struck by a car driven by J. Dudley of Ostrander, Wash., on the Pacific highway two miles south of Castle Rock.

Cunningham had stopped with his motorcycle at the end of a highway bridge. His companion, Miles Brown, of Olympia, was sitting on the bridge railing, and escaped injury. Dudley was being questioned by authorities today.

PENDLETON, Apr. 11 (AP)—A man by the name of Smith, 64, committed suicide in Milton this morning by hanging himself. His body was found this morning in a rooming house with towels tightly knotted into a rope about his neck. Little is known of the man. Who was a transient, and it is said he had recently come to Milton from Georgia.

Admits Kissing
Brother-in-Law,
But Only Once

CHICAGO, Apr. 11 (AP)—Mrs. Anne Walsh Carrington testified today that she kissed her brother-in-law, Campbell Carrington, just once. She told of the incident when cross examined in the divorce suit in which Colonel Edward C. Carrington accused his brother as co-respondent. Mrs. Carrington also asks for divorce.

When asked if she ever had kissed Campbell, who is here ready to testify voluntarily in behalf of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Carrington at first said "No." Then she amended:

"Oh yes I did. I must be accurate about this."

She then said that once, when the colonel was asleep and Campbell was sitting in the next room, she slipped in and kissed Campbell on his bald head.

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COMMON COLD
BLAMED FOR
MOST DEATHSAmerican Chemical Soci-
ety Hears Report on
Contagious DiseaseSEEKS ORGANIZED
WAR ON DISEASEGovernment Is Asked to
Take Hand in Fight for
Health, in Annual Con-
vention in Richmond

RICHMOND, Va., Apr. 11 (AP)—The common cold was blamed for causing more deaths and economic wastes than any other disease in a report submitted today at the opening of the 73rd American Chemical society's annual convention.

Directed by Dr. Charles H. Herty, of New York City, chairman of one of the organs committees, the report recommended that the federal government prosecute a thoroughly organized war on human disease and establish a world clearing house of health in Washington.

BEST PREVENTATIVES
CHICAGO (Special)—The expression, "catching cold," is a very common one and to many does not have the significance it should, declares C. T. Chamberlain, M. D., of Natchez, Miss., a member of the Gorgas Memorial institute.

Dr. Chamberlain continues: "By catching cold is usually meant that condition characterized by watery discharges from eyes and nose, accompanied by sneezing, which, unless corrected early, is followed by a cough that may give trouble. This depends upon the severity of the infection and the resistance of the individual."

"At this season of the year it is well to consider the real significance of catching cold. It is not the simple thing that so many seem to think and it may result in serious consequences."

Two Groups
"For practical purposes colds may be divided into two groups. In one group are placed all those so called colds caused by irritation of membrane of the nose from foreign substances. Among them are the 'Hay Fever Colds' caused by the pollen of different plants, especially rag weed, though a great many other foreign substances may cause colds of this type."

"In group two are the colds not caused by foreign substances. They are all infectious and contagious and are caused by one or more organisms."

"The nose stands at the gateway of the respiratory tract. It is lined with a mucous membrane peculiar to itself, but continuous with that of the throat and bronchial tubes. Since the ends of the olfactory nerves are situated in the nasal mucous membrane it is easy to see why our sense of smell departs when we have a bad head cold."

"This gateway, which I have just mentioned, and the throat as well as the lungs, are the most important parts of the respiratory system."

MAY AFFECT WILLOS' APPEAL

Salem, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—The appeal of James Willos to the federal supreme court will in all probability be dropped, it was indicated here today. Willos' appeal is based upon a point similar to that turned down by the supreme court at Washington this morning for lack of jurisdiction and has not been pressed pending adjudication of Kelley's appeal.

Willos was convicted and sentenced to death along with James Willos and Tom Murray who were his companions in the prison break in August, 1925. Murray ended his life in prison.

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
