Anne Nichols' Comedy Due At Arcade Tomorrow

Their journey from southern Alaska over the mountains down the Yukon, along the bleak shores of Siberia and then back down the coast was filmed with a fine sense of the dramatic and with a careful attention to detail.

Rather than share the ranch on which she had lived all her life with a man so detestable to her, she decides to buy his interest. When this news reaches Maloney he works out a plan, the first step of which is to trick his way out of jail. What he does after that to expose the crooked plot makes the picture very tense and exciting. The denouement is clever in the extreme.

"Fifth Avenue" Is Showing Last Time Tonight

It is seldom, indeed, that so powerful a story is presented in so pleasing a manner as is "Fifth Avenue", which was shown with exceptional success at the Sherry theater yesterday. The production is unusually satisfying and speaks well for the producers. It will have its last showing tonight.

As might be imagined from its title—"New York's Fifth Avenue"—the production is lavish, and effectively presents the atmosphere of its romantic setting.
