FREE SPEECH IS AT STAKE, CLAIM

Liberal Club in Pennsylvania State Normal Under Attack

WESTCHESTER, Pa., Apr. 12 (AP)—The controversy in the state normal school here over the dismissal of two professors and the official suppression of the Students Liberal club today was fast outgrowing its original status as a local issue.

While the trustees were pondering the demand that the board "justify the club in its active continuance," members of the local American Legion post who supported the dismissal of the teachers, were criticized by their comrades in Washington and New York.

The ousted professors combined appeals for the privilege of free speech with an attack on the governing heads of the school and the demand that they be replaced with "the normal school executives available."

Professors John A. Kinneman and Robert T. Korlin, whose sympathetic association with the liberal club was alleged to have resulted in the loss of their posts, asserted today that they did not desire reinstatement under the present regime.

Criticizing John H. Hollinger, business manager of the school, Professor Kinneman said:

"Hollingerism and free speech are the basic issues involved in this unfortunate affair."

Support of the professors and the liberal club has been extended by the William Straight post of the American Legion and by Congressman Hamilton Fish Jr., of New York.

Fish Supports Club Congressman Fish, in a statement at Washington offered his "cooperation in any way to have the legion uphold the guarantee of the constitution in favor of freedom of speech."

Those messages were considered of significance in view of the report that it was protest of members of the local legion post against the liberal club's criticism of the government's Nicaraguan policy that precipitated the present controversy.

The stand of the local club was commended in a telegram from the Yale liberal club which urged that the "movement for the free speech" be continued.

In its resolution urging the reinstatement of the professors and a clean bill of health for the liberal club, the organization openly defied Dr. Smith's order that it hold no further meetings. The reason for Dr. Smith's action was a rumored investigation of the club by federal authorities, the resolution states.
